The young victims were Wallace Chesner, four years old, and his brother, Solomon, three. The mother saved herself and her 18 months old daughter, Chikie, only after she had dashed through flames which reached to the roof, and burned the flesh from her feet. The father saved himself and his eldest son.

Hong Kong, April 10.—The Hong Kong Chamber of Commerce has sent a circular to London, Manchester, Liverpool, Bradford, Glasgow, Shanghai, Tien Tsin and other Chambers of Commerce, suggesting diplomatic action against the Japan cotton spinners' associations in their proposal to insert lottery tickets in bales of cotton yarn, thus artificially fostering the Japanese trade to the detriment of the Indian.
