EIGHTEEN LEPROUS IN CANADA.
In the leper lazaretto at Tracadie, N.B., there are thirteen lepers, and in the Darcy Island lazaretto, B.C., there are five lepers, as shown by the report of the Minister of Agriculture for the fiscal year 1917-18. These are the only cases of leprosy in the Dominion as far as known.

OFFERED NEW POSITION.
Chief of Police Finley, Fredericton, formerly of St. John, has been offered a position as sub-inspector in charge of the St. John River counties, under Chief Inspector Wilson, for the enforcement of the Prohibition Act. Mr. Finley, it is believed, will accept the offer.

TO BE KNOWN AS CANADIAN NATIONAL RYS.

A circular has just been issued over the signature of the President, Mr. D. B. Hanna, announcing that effective January 1st, 1919, all Government Railway lines, heretofore known as Canadian Northern Railway System, including its eastern and western lines, and Canadian Government Railways, composing the National Transcontinental Railway, Intercolonial Railway of Canada and the Prince Edward Island Railway, will hereafter be known and operated under the name "Canadian National Railways," the headquarters of which will be in Toronto.

All officers of the system are requested to use the name "Canadian National Railways" in the course of operating correspondence and general conduct of affairs. It is also desirable that the public and the railway's connections adopt and put into practice at once the new title in addressing communications, reports and general correspondence to the various offices of the Canadian National Railways.

MOTHER AND SON DIE OF INFLUENZA.
Mrs. Herbert Matchett and Son Russell Passed Away at Red Bank Within Past Week.

The sad death occurred at Red Bank this morning of Mrs. Herbert Matchett from illness of a few days of influenza. The deceased, who was formerly Miss Gunn of Maple Glen, had only lost her son from the same disease on Saturday. She is survived by her husband and two sons—Stanley, with the Canadian forces in France, and Allison at home; also three daughters—Margaret, (Mrs. Herbert Taylor), Edna (Mrs. George Harris), and Miss Ida, at home.

He was about thirty years of age, and besides his father, brothers and sisters, leaves a wife, formerly Miss Barbara Howe, of Red Bank, and four small children. SOME REMARKABLE STORM SCENES IN "SHARK MUNROE."

William S. Hart Performs During Fest in the Teeth of Big Tempest.

In William S. Hart's new photoplay, "Shark Munroe," an Artcraft Picture directed by himself, under the supervision of Thomas H. Ince, and written by C. Gardner Sullivan, there are some remarkable storm scenes.
