Household Notes.

If there is a cold chicken left from the roast cut it into dice, mix with a cream dressing, put in the baking dish sprinkle the top with cheese and stuffed olives and bake in a quick oven Hollandaise sauce, and served on until brown.

To remove warts without leaving a scar, drop oil of cinnamon carefully on the place two or three times a day. This will occasion no soreness and the warts will disappear in the course of four or five weeks.

When cutting garments by paper patterns, much time can be saved in marking perforations for tucks, etc., by putting carbon paper under the top piece of goods and marking two pieces at the same time.

Extra crab meat for which there are ne shells is delicious dressing with round croutons. Shreds of red peppers sprinkled on top just as the crab is served makes it more artistic.

To use liquid bluing without removing the cork, bore a hole in the centre and insert a quill, having it extend below and above the cork. In this manner it is easy to use the exacamount and less danger of waste,

Jewelry can be successfully cleaned by washing it in hot soap suds i which a little ammonia has been dissolved. Shake off the water and lay the jewelry in a small box of fine sawdust to dry. This method leaves no scratches or marks of any kind.

Canned peaches left from one day's essert are delicious put in individual deep pie molds and baked with strips of rich pie dough across the top. Put a lump of butter in the bottom of the dish and sprinkle sugar and cinnamon on top of the peaches.

To stone raisins free the raisins rom the stems and put them in a bowl. Cover them with boiling water and let them stand for two minutes. Pour off the water, open the raisins nd the seed can be removed quicky and easily without the usual sticki-

A very handy stocking supporter is nade by cutting a piece of wide clasic in three-inch pieces. Sew a fastner on each end of each piece of the lastic. Fasten one end to the underwear and the other to the stocking. One or two may be used on each

little water and the edges not stuck ogether. Then, when it is baked the op crust may be lifted off and a syrup of water, sugar, spice and butter poured in. In this way the juice loes not boil out in the baking and eave the pie dry.

To wash brushes and combs, put a easpoonful of ammonia in a basin of ot water and dip the brush up and own in it, letting the comb remain in the water for a few minutes. In this way all the grease will disappear, and after rinsing in cold water, both brushes and combs will be perfectly

In many cases after a grease, spot nas been removed there will be left a laint mark of the spot, which may be noticed, after a time, by the dust which adheres to this spot. Make a aturated solution of alum and water Heat this slowly on the stove and when very hot apply to the grease as before. The effect will be all that is

One of the finest diamonds in the world is the Florentine Diamond, held by the Imperial Treasury of Austria. This diamond is principally interesting however, on account of its curious history. It may be said to have had an adventurous career. Originally it belonged to Charles the Bold, Duke of Burgundy, who carelessly thrust it into his pocket as one day he sallied forth to battle. In the fury of the engagement the diamond dropped out of the Duke's pocket, and was lost. Later, a Swiss soldier espied it lying in a roadway. Having no idea of its enormous value, he one day showed it to a priest, who offered him about two shillings, which the soldier gladly accepted. The priest sold it to a jeweller for half-a-crown, the jeweller to a merchant for something like \$2,500, and the merchant sold it to an Italian noble for \$1,000 more. Eventually it became the property of the Pope, and, after many further ad ventures, passed into the hands of the Imperial Family of Austria.


