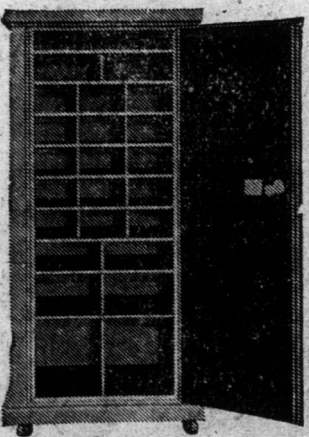
Arm Shattered.
