Notes and Comments.

From the last issue of the N. Y. Fishing Gazette, we learn that the Booth Fisheries Co. are erecting a \$300,000 cold storage plant at Minneapolis. It is expected that a part of the building will be ready by next fall. The building will be constructed of concrete and will be 138 by 100 feet, and eight or ten stories high. We would like to know what has become of the Booth Cold Storage project in Newfoundland, which the Morris Government boomed so much a year ago. Then again there was an earlier move with Trefethen and Lord, who were in so great a hurry to start that one of them was most importunate in his enquiries from "Friend Morris" as to the meeting of the Legislature. Assemblies have opened and closed since then and several years have passed, but the project never materialized, but vanished into thin air, as all the industrial schemes, boosted by the Morris Government have done.

In reference to the success of Sir

Robert Bond's arrangement with Greece for a reduction in the prohibitive duty on dried cod, we find the following testimony in the same N. Y. Fishing Gazette. It is from Consul A. B. Cooke, Patras, Greece, and relates to the Consular district of Patras, some 14,000 square miles in area:—

"The result of this treaty was the immediate appearance on the Greek market of the dried Labrador cod or stockfish.

"The cod is brought direct to this market from the Labrador coasts or from Newfoundland in steamers or sailing vessels by the cargo. In 1912 there were thus brought to the markets of this consular district at least 42,000 quintals (quintal—112 pounds) of cod. The fish were delivered at Greek ports at the price of \$5.60 per quintal. They were brought in by local importers and disposed of to the retail market. Prices have been so favorable in this trade that the consumer is able to buy his dried cod at 7 to 8 cents per pound. He therefore has little inclination to pay 17 or 20 cents for domestic fresh fish.

"The total value of the importation of cod for 1912, at wholesale import prices for this district, according to data furnished by importers, was \$234,780. As stated, the cod is brought by the cargo, loose in the ship's hold.

"In addition to the trade in cod there is also an appreciable trade carried on in Labrador salmon. This article comes via Liverpool or New York, shipped in tins of 300 pounds net. For prime large red fish the price of this commodity ranged last year (1912) from \$28.75 to \$28.25 per tierce c. l. f. at Greek ports. This market takes 300 to 400 tierces of salmon annually, which is consumed by the wealthier classes."

A rather curious incident took place at Halifax on Friday last during the riot in connection with the tram-car lock-out. This was the arrest of a Thiel man by the police. Here is the Halifax Chronicle's account:—

"John Mason, the chief of the Thiel men, however, was trying to couple one of the damaged cars up to the relief car when a cop noticed a bulge in his pistol pocket. Instantly four husky blue coats leaped on him and hustled him to the station where the charge of 'carrying a pistol without having any reason to apprehend violence to his person or property' was lodged against him."

The official police, apparently, have

their eyes on the unofficial detectives.

"A Chronicle reporter, on Friday night, interviewed some of the strike-breakers. Ten of the thirty belong to the Thiel Detective Agency and have had considerable experience. They were in the Porcupine strike and passed through many trying experiences. They one and all, say that the Halifax mob is as likely as any they have met. The ten detectives have been in Halifax for the last three days in order to get in touch with the situation."

The Canadian Government has a bill before the Dominion Parliament to appropriate ten millions of dollars for the promotion of agricultural instruction. Canada has learned by experience the value of Agricultural Colleges and schools, so has England, Denmark and the States. It remained, however, for the Morris administration to destroy the foundation of such a policy, laid down by the last Liberal Administration, and to inaugurate a giving-out policy in which some \$100,000 or more has been wasted. What is the use of Morris talking of an agricultural policy when he has negated the only policy which can ensure success? What advantage has Newfoundland reaped from the retaining of three members of the Tory Party as an Agricultural Commission? They were in no sense scientists or experts in agriculture. Some \$6,000 a year has been wasted, in paying salaries and expenses for work that was in no way commensurate with the money spent on it. These men were provided with jobs. These jobs had good salaries attached to them. Such were the main uses to which the money spent on the Commission was put. The money formed golden chains to bind members to an extravagant and reckless leader.

Governor Visits C.B. Schools.

This forenoon, His Excellency Governor Davidson and suite visited the Christian Brothers' Schools, St. Patrick's Hall, and were conducted through the class rooms which they inspected. The distinguished party were received by the Superior, Rev. Brother Ryan, and also by Brother Kennedy. As the Vice-Regal party entered the rooms, they were greeted with the National Anthem beautifully rendered by the boys of the choir. His Excellency expressed his pleasure at what he saw after inspecting the schools, and congratulated the teachers and pupils on the great excellence evident in the work of both teachers and pupils. The boys were awarded a half holiday.
