DANNUNZIO IN CONTROL OF FIUME.

PARIS, Sept. 16.
The Jugo Slav Peace Delegation here has issued the following statement regarding the situation at Fiume: "An armed conflict occurred at Fiume on the nights of September 12th and 13th, when one thousand Italian soldiers arrived from the occupied territory of Istria and Slavonia. The battleship Dante Alighieri was unable to sail, her engines having been damaged purposely. Troops landed from the ship and joined the Danubian volunteers. Italian military authorities and commanders of Allied troops were powerless to restore order, preparations for the rebellion having been carefully made. The rebels drove away the English patrol stationed in the Governor's palace. Demonstrations against America, Great Britain, France and Jugo Slavia occurred. Dannunzio addressed the soldiers and crowds and then the Italians drove the Jugo Slavs and soldiers from Fiume and Susak. The French, American and British have left Fiume on board ships. It is feared that the regulars of the Italian Army, who were sent against the rebels, will make common cause with them."

ONLY CARRIED AWAY.

ROME, Sept. 16.
The Republican Party has passed the following resolution relative to the Dannunzio coup at Fiume: "The temporary liberators of Fiume were carried away by noble impulse rather than political calculation. They thus deserve the sympathy of the nation, although it is an illusion to consider as an accomplished fact the occupation of Fiume as final."

UNIONISTS AND LABORERS.

LONDON, Sept. 16.
Informal discussions are afoot as to the possibility of a working agreement between the younger members of the Unionist Party, headed by Lord Robert Cecil, and the Parliamentary Labor Party, according to the political correspondent of the Central News.

WITHDRAWING FROM BUDAPEST.

BUDAPEST, Sept. 16.
The Rumanian Army has begun to withdraw from Budapest, a steady

movement of trains being in progress. It is believed that retirement will be completed within a fortnight.

THE SYRIAN OCCUPATION.

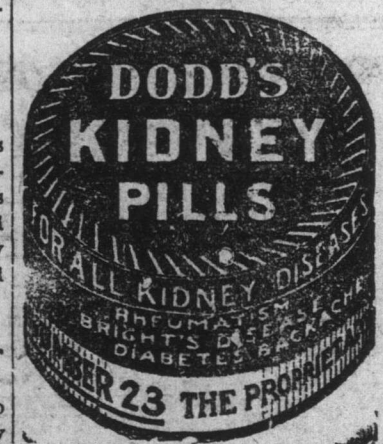
PARIS, Sept. 16.
An agreement reached by Premier Clemenceau and Field Marshal Allenby of the British Army concerning the occupation of Syria, provided for the evacuation of all Area north of the frontier between Palestine and Syria on or before November 1st by British troops, according to morning newspapers. The British will be relieved by French forces with the exception of the districts of Damascus, Homs, Palah and Aleppo, which will be left out of the area of occupation, but will pass under French influence, it is said.

MUST HAVE LEGAL RESIDENCE.

VIENNA, Sept. 16.
In an effort to cope with the food and fuel conditions, the Austrian Government has just issued a decree expelling from the country all persons who do not claim legal residence here.

WILSON'S INTERPRETATION.

On Board Wilson's Special, Sept. 16.
Setting forth publicly for the first time his interpretation of the League of Nations Covenant as it affects Ireland, President Wilson said in a statement to-day that the League would constitute a forum, before which could be brought all claims for self determination, which are likely to affect the peace of the world. The Covenant would not bind the United States to assist in putting down rebellion in



any foreign country, nor would it limit the power of this country to recognize the independence of any people who seek to secure freedom. He said Ireland's case was not heard at Versailles because it didn't come within the jurisdiction of the Peace Conference. The President's statement was in reply to a series of questions sent to him by the San Francisco Labor Council.

BULGARIAN TREATY ADOPTED.

PARIS, Sept. 17.
The Supreme Council has definitely adopted the Bulgarian treaty, which will be delivered to the Bulgarian plenipotentiaries Friday morning. The presentation of this document will be without ceremony.

CISTINE CHOIR AT NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.
The Italian choir of the Vatican, possibly the oldest organization of its kind in the world, arrived in New York to-day and thus broke a precedent which has lasted for a thousand years. The American tour of the choir will be the first time since its formation in the fourth century that this famous body of singers ever left the precincts of the Vatican. After a series of concerts here the choir will visit the principal cities of the United States and Canada.

TRANS-PACIFIC AIR FLIGHT TO AUSTRALIA.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Sept. 16.
Among the arrivals on the steamer Princess last night was Captain Eric Donaldson, who has announced that he will essay a trans-Atlantic flight to Australia by airplane. His choice of a machine is a Sopwith two-seater, equipped with a special Rolls-Royce engine similar to that used by Capt. Hawker.

CINCINNATI WINS PENNANT.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.
Cincinnati won the National Pennant.

A DENIAL.

LONDON, Sept. 16.
The Press Association issues a statement from Downing Street, categorically denying, apparently on behalf of Lloyd George, the Bull testimony before the United States Foreign Relations Committee, that he had discussed with the Premier peace proposals of Lenin previous to the Premier's denial that the Soviet Government had made peace overtures. The statement says: "While it is not suggested that Bullitt did not talk with the Premier, it is categorically denied that any statement was given for publication, and the whole account is authoritatively declared to be absolutely inaccurate in important particulars and grotesque."

FRENCH FINANCIAL MISSION.

PARIS, Sept. 17.
A report that the French Government has appointed a special mission of financial specialists to proceed to New York is printed by the Gaulois to-day. The object of the

mission, the newspaper states, is to study in that city measures necessary "to reduce tremendous losses suffered by France through the tension in exchange."

THE HURRICANE'S WORK.

CORPUS CHRISTI, Sept. 17.
To-day more than seventy hours after the tropical hurricane and tidal waves that tore huge rents in this coast city and environs, it was still impossible to estimate with any degree of accuracy the loss of life or damage to property. Each report from the searchers, however, revealed the increasing magnitude of the disaster. It was believed that it might be a week or more before the true extent is known. Officials generally were agreed the death list will be in excess of a hundred, and some official estimates placed it as between two and three hundred with hundreds of persons injured and suffering from exposure. Estimates of property loss varied from ten to fifteen millions.

STEEL WORKERS MAY STRIKE.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 17.
John Fitzpatrick, chairman of the National Committee for organizing iron and steel workers, who arrived here to-day from Cleveland, told newspaper men that unless at the last minute a telegram was received from Elbert Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation Board, a strike of iron and steel workers would go into effect on Sept. 22nd.

ILLINOIS STRIKERS PUNISHED.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 16.
A convention of the United Mine Workers of America yesterday disposed of the Illinois strike problem, refusing seats to the contesting delegates by a vote of almost eight to one, and thereby sustaining the action of the International and State Mine officials in depriving twenty-five Illinois legions of their character for indulging in an unauthorized strike. The vote was taken after two days' debate.
