

Proceedings of the Synod

TUESDAY, June 27.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod met at 3.30, the Lord Bishop read the prayers and declared the House open for business.

The minutes of the previous session were read and confirmed.

Rev. C.A. Moulton moved the adoption of the report of the Literature Committee, which on being duly seconded, a discussion ensued respecting the carrying on of the "Diocesan Magazine," and its suggestion for its future management. The debate occupied the attention of the House until the closing hour at 5.30, when it was on motion adjourned.

EVENING SESSION.

The House resumed at 8 o'clock, the Bishop presiding.

Canon Bolt invited the House to continue the discussion of the motion for the appointment of a standing committee to report to the Synod on its next session concerning the relations from the Church of England in Canada relative to the inclusion of the Church in Newfoundland within the Canadian Church, and read for the information of the House from the Synod Journals and other documents the letters and resolutions sent this subject which the Synod had received and discussed in previous sessions.

At 8.15 the Bishop read the report of the general result of the historical review which since 1914, the subject has been in abeyance, possibly, as the speaker thought, owing to the war.

On the discussion which ensued, several members spoke, a resume of their remarks being appended.

Rev. A. E. Tulk felt that the time was not opportune. We have had in the past a strong connection with England. He would advise hesitancy in any step to be taken to sever this connection. He feared that connection with Canada may bind us to decisions which may hinder our development. It had been said, however, that the Church in Newfoundland may have something to bring to the Church in Canada.

Rev. A. E. Butler thought it right and proper to have a Standing Committee to consider this whole matter. While we may carry something to the Church in Canada, we may not learn much. He would point out that our Apostolic Succession had come to us from Canada.

Rev. Canon Smart had very great pleasure in supporting the resolution for a Standing Committee. He did not feel that any harm was likely to accrue from such union, but a great deal of good. In his opinion England had given very great help in money, but very little of inspiration. On the other hand he felt that if we had been united with Canada previous to 1918, our financial position would have been much better than it is today. Under such union, we would have had wider vision, we should have taken part in that great financial drive which took place in the Church of Canada, and in his humble opinion we should not have been in the position financially that we are at the present time. We have had visits from many representative Churchmen, such men as Dean Lwyd the Dean Tucker, and it was his great pleasure to visit the General Synod of the Church in Canada in 1918, and to carry to them a letter of greeting from the Bishop of this Diocese. During that visit he met many of the great Canadian churchmen. My impression, said the speaker, was an inspiration at the fuller life of the wider and bigger Church of Canada. Our linking up with Canada is not going to restrict our development, either in a general way or along certain specific lines of churchmanship. After presenting the Bishop's letter of greeting with which I was entrusted, said Canon Smart, the Archbishop of Rupertland, the presiding Archbishop, assured me that when the Church in Newfoundland entered the Church of Canada it would be on her own volition. He had no hesitancy in advocating the appointment of a committee.

Rev. A. B. Stirling thought that we should not ask Canada to take us in because we are in need, but we should go in a dignified manner, as a sister church to a bigger sister. We need information, and this information can be gathered by such a committee, and when it reports here at the next Synod on the invitations received, we may more intelligently discuss this important question.

The debate at this stage was closed and the motion being put by the President, it was carried by a large majority.

The House then resumed the discussion on the report of the Board of Directors of the Church of England Colleges. Many members spoke and the debate was continued until 10 o'clock, the time for the consideration of motions, when it was further adjourned.

Rev. W. R. J. Hight moved the further discussion of his resolutions which had introduced at yesterday's session, concerning the enforcement of the Prohibition Act when several members spoke.

Rev. J. T. Hiscory then moved an amendment as follows, which was duly seconded, and occupied the time of the session until closing hour, when it was moved, seconded, and

agreed that the debate be adjourned until to-morrow.

WHEREAS: This country has now had an experience—by no means satisfactory—of over five years of a Prohibition regime.

AND WHEREAS: There appears to be great and growing opposition to the continuation of this Prohibition regime, due partly to an impression that the Act as embodied in the Statutes is an impracticable one, but in the main in a strong feeling that the law is not equitable in its effects.

AND WHEREAS: To combat effectively the great evils attendant on smuggling and the illicit manufacture of ardent spirits would entail an additional burden of expenditure too grievous to be borne by the taxpayers in times of grave depression like these present and certainly inadvisable unless by a direct mandate from an unquestionable majority of the registered voters in Newfoundland.

AND WHEREAS: This Diocesan Synod knows of no reason why it should alter the decision made at two previous sessions, not to commit itself definitely to the regime of Prohibition in Newfoundland, but is strongly of opinion that there should be a Referendum on the question of this big and outstanding question of the time.

IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED: That we do hereby memorialize the Government of Newfoundland to undertake such a Referendum on the question of Prohibition along the lines recommended in the Report unanimously signed by the Royal Commission of 1921 and at as early a date as is practicable.

It was on motion, the House adjourned with the Bishop's blessing.

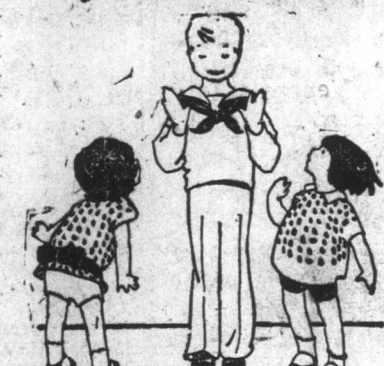
