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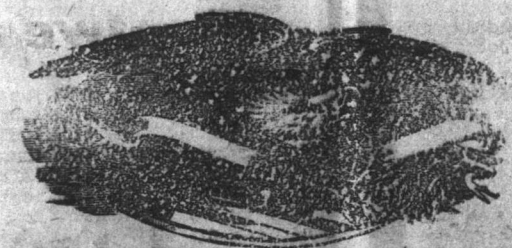

Our Montreal Letter.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

Montreal, June 22nd.—The financial report of the Catholic School Commission of Montreal for the fiscal year 1921-22, has just been issued. It covers 246 pages of printed matter, and contains all the receipts and expenses of the Commission, the number of pupils attending in each District, the average daily attendance, the number of teachers, both religious and lay, the salaries paid, the cost per capita to educate each child, the names of the different schools and the number of pupils attending each school, the report of the Comptroller of Finance, and the assets and liabilities of the Commission. This report simply deals with primary schools, and does not include private schools, Colleges, High Schools, or Technical Schools. Here are a few facts about the Catholic primary schools of the Metropolis of Canada which may interest your readers.

1. There are 191 schools managed by the Commission.
2. There are 2458 teachers employed, of which 1479 are religious and 979 are lay teachers.
3. 86,487 pupils are in attendance. This does not include Westmount, Outremont, Verdun, and Montreal West.

4. The total cost per capita is \$25.44 or with additional expenses \$52.48.
5. The daily average attendance is 86 per cent.
6. The total cost of maintenance is \$3,923,659.52.

7. The assets amount to \$19,830,669.06, and the liabilities to \$17,109,989.85, including loans amounting to \$7,900.00 bearing interest from 4 to 6 per cent and payable from 5 to 40 years.

8. The School Buildings and Furniture are valued at \$18,751,077.49.
9. The School Taxes paid by the City of Montreal were \$3,927,548.34, and Government Grants were \$43,619.83.

10. The salaries to teachers and caretakers were \$1,970,359.28.
11. 20,384 pupils deposited \$51,783.57 in the School Saving Bank in all the schools.

12. There are 5 School Visitors, four French and one English-speaking, whose salaries range from \$1800 to \$2000.

13. Lay Principals receive \$2500 and with extras about \$2800. The teachers \$1200 to \$2400.

14. Superiors or Directors of Religious Institutions \$850, and each member of the teaching staff \$610. The house, light and heat are also furnished by the Commission.
15. Sisters of the different congregations and the Superiores each receive \$500 and the dwelling, light and heat free.

16. There are 31 Commissioners, 6 in each of the four districts, and 5 on the Central Board whose work deals with the finance of the different districts. The chairman of each district receives \$900 a year, and each member \$600. The Chairman of the Finance or Central Board receives \$1400 and each member \$800. There are four Director-Secretaries, and each receives \$4,000 a year.

17. Each school is visited twice a year by two school visitors, French and English, and the Provincial Government Inspector.

18. At the end of May each year, each lay teacher receives his or her notice of dismissal, and unless you're given your contract papers to sign for another year, your services are no longer required. This year probably about twenty in all the districts will not be re-engaged.

19. No teacher is allowed to be engaged in any of the schools without his or her Diploma. Up to two years ago, the Provincial Government School Inspectors had the right granted them by the Department of Public Instruction at Quebec to give such teacher or teachers a permit for one year on conditions that the candidate or candidates would write for a Diploma in June of the following year, but this privilege has been abolished.

Track and field athletics are on the upgrade here of late, but even in the record-breaking which accompanies every school meet, such a Saturday of new records as marked the Loyola College annual on Saturday is unusual. No less than thirteen former marks went by the board, of which W. Montabone made two. He won the open half mile in 2:12 2-5, and the 120 yards hurdles in 15 seconds flat, both new records, and in addition won the one mile race in 5:05, and the open broad jump, in which he cleared 19 feet 10 inches. It was the second year in succession he has won the senior aggregate.

G. Tynas captured the junior aggregate, winning the 100 yards dash for under sixteen in 11 2-5 seconds, the 220 in 25 4-5 seconds, the 440 in 1:02, a new record for the juniors, the high jump with a leap of 5 ft. 1 inch, another record, and the broad jump in which event he cleared 15 feet 4 1/2 in. W. Lacey made a new record for the 100 yards dash under eighteen, of 11 2-5 sec.; he added another when he reeled off the 220 in the same division in 25 2-5, quite a long way behind Cannon's performance of 24 flat in the open furlongs. Leary made it three with half a mile in 2:15. L. Burke made an 80 yard hurdle record for the under-fourteen class of 13 2-5 sec. Q. Shaughnessy, in the same age division, raised the high jump record to 4 feet 7 in., while in the open shot event, D. Walsh put the weight 37 ft. 6 1/4 in. E. Cannon's 56 sec. in the 440 was a new mark in the open event, and MacMahon's discus throw of 83 ft. 3 in. was also a new mark. The relay race set the final new record of 3:53 1-5.

The City Council for the third time refused to sanction Daylight Saving time. The vote was 15 to 10. The question is therefore disposed of for the present year and Alderman Gareau who championed the motion on every occasion, says he'll let the matter drop.

Friday, June 15th, was an unlucky day for thirteen persons, three of whom met death and eleven others were injured by accidents. The first victim was Lawrence Tannenbaum, 1689 Tupper Street, a prominent notary who met his death at La Prairie, when his car in which the deceased and three others were driving overturned on the King Edward Highway. The machine swerved to one side as a curve was reached, swayed perilously on the brink of the ditch and then the rear wheel slid into the ditch and the car overturned completely. Mr. Tannenbaum who was driving, was pinned beneath the machine, and his chest was crushed in, causing immediate death. The others were thrown out into a field, one being seriously injured.

Thrown from the rear of a truck when the machine struck a hole in the road at the corner of Eadie and Church Avenue, Cote St. Paul, Rosaire Desormeaux, 11 years of age, son of Constable Desormeaux of the St. Henri police, fell beneath the wheels of another auto and was fatally injured. At the time of the accident the boy was changing his position on the truck.

Six persons were injured, and one of them may die, as the result of an accident that occurred on Gouin boulevard in Sault au Recollet. Three of the victims were taken to the Hotel Dieu Hospital, where it was found that one of them had suffered a fracture of the skull and that his condition was critical. Death took place two days later. The accident occurred when the automobile in which the six persons were driving struck a post at the side of the road as it swerved to avoid a collision with a motor truck.

Two others were injured at Westmount when the auto truck crashed into a lamp post and turned over on its side. Both men were treated at the Western Hospital. Sunday, June 17th, one man was killed and ten injured in auto accidents, besides a sailor being drowned in the canal.

While reaching out to pluck a leaf from a tree, five year old Jack Brails, of 189 Jeanne Mance Street, fell from the second story balcony of his home and was fatally injured. The victim was picked up and taken to the Royal Victoria Hospital, where he died as the result of a fracture of the skull. According to his parents, the little boy had been playing on the leaves when he suddenly noticed the gutter on the tree branch, waving temptingly. He climbed up on the railing and reached over to pluck a leaf, but overbalanced and fell to the pavement below.

Out-of-town delegates to the Canadian Medical Association paid a visit to the Montreal General Hospital where they inspected the big centrally located hospital where thousands of accident cases are treated in the outdoor department, and where men, women and children are cared for and treated daily.

The delegates found much to ponder over in the various wards and departments where doctors and surgeons attend to the wants of the patients in a thorough and scientific manner. Many of the worst cases were being studied during the visit of the delegates, who expressed their admiration for the thoroughness of the preparation for handling the slightest cut to the most serious cases.

with muffled and unheard steps thru the grass at their back the girl uttered a warning, and the man with an embarrassed laugh, secreted the "pencil" but not before it was evident that it was more than a pencil, but nearer a hypodermic syringe, that was the object with which he was "twitting."

Five years in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed on Jas. Murphy by Judge Perrault in the Court of Special Sessions. Murphy was convicted of stealing parcels from the Dominion Express Office, containing silks, valued at \$400. When he appeared before Chief Judge Decarie in Enquete Court recently, he made a desperate attempt to escape and actually reached the revolving doors at the entrance to the court house. He was stopped, however, by two lawyers, who barred his way long enough for the guards to catch him.

In passing sentence, Judge Perrault reviewed the past criminal career of the prisoner, which showed that he spent many years behind the prison walls. His last term was two years.

Another penitentiary sentence was passed by Mr. Justice Wilson in the Court of King's Bench, when Edmund Leclerc was condemned to three years at St. Vincent de Paul, Leclerc, who was charged with attempted murder, but who pleaded guilty to wounding, fired several shots at Mrs. Victor Marcotte, of 353 Sanguinet Street, wounding her very seriously. The passion crime was recognized, and it was understood that it was a case of jealousy, although the case never was tried in the higher courts. When the sentence was imposed, Leclerc, who had so far adopted a stoical attitude, broke into tears.

Our Dumb Animals.

Report of Chief Agent for Week Ending June 29th, 1923.

Attended to the landing of forty-five head of cattle from the Sable I.; also forty-eight head from the train; all in good condition. Saw them all watered, and taken to pasture. Attended two sales of cattle at Campbell & McKay's and one at G. Neal's. Two injured animals were taken away on a sledge. There is a great need of a better conveyance for removing injured animals, which if kept in a central place, it would be an easy matter to secure a team to remove the sick and injured beasts. Perhaps some of our humanely disposed citizens, who are in sympathy with our dumb animals, would make us a present of one. There are also complaints about pigs and hens arriving by steamers being overcrowded in crates. We have written the agents who will attend to this matter with the shippers in Canada. At the instructions of the Municipal Council Agent, I put to sleep four unlicensed dogs. I was called to Toppal Road about a cow belonging to Mr. Fred Lester, which was struck by a motor truck, owned by the N.E. Brewery. The Veterinary Surgeons, Drs. Smith and Steward are attending to it. I have had to put to death several diseased domestic animals. Quite a number of calls have been attended to regarding lame horses and over-driving. I also humanely put to death a very valuable five-year-old horse owned and raised by Mr. Thomas Murphy, Hamilton Avenue. The horse, in some unaccountable way broke its leg while on pasture. Vet. Surgeon Bishop attended it but was unable to make a cure. The loss a very severe one to the owner. Protect the birds.
