Britain Pays to U.S. \$92,000,000 on Her War Debt

SETTLEMENT MADE WITH LIB-ERTY BONDS, PURCHASED UNDER PAR.

New York, Dec. 15 .- The second semi-annual installment of interest on the British Government's war debt to the United States and first payment on the principal account, since the debt agreement was signed, was

The total involved is \$92,000,000, of which \$69,000,000 represents interest, duplicating the payment of last June, and \$23,000,000 represents principal All the bonds required to make the payment have been transferred from the offices of J. P.Morgan and Company, fiscal agents for Great

Britain in this county, to the Nev York Federal Reserve Bank, as agent for the Treasury. The movement of these bonds has

been spread over the last two or three weeks to eliminate the risks involved in the transfer of the entire amount at one time, so that the operation to day consists merely of the notification by the Morgan firm of the bank to turn the bonds over to the Treasury. Some slight cash payment may be needed to bring the amount of the deposited bonds and accumulated interest to the exact total required, but this is extremely small.

The bonds used for the payment are chiefly of the Second and Fourth Liberty loans, which have been cheaper on the average than the other loans. It is estimated that by taking advantage of the option of paying in Liberty bonds rather than in cash the British Government has saved approximately \$1,800,000, since all bonds have been purchased at a

discount of more than a point. Since the bonds will be cancelled when turned over to the Treasury Department in the same manner as those purchased by the Government's sinking funds, the payment will involve the actual reduction of the United States public debt to the extent of the bonds submitted. The process of cancellation probably will occur at the Reserve Bank, thus obviating the necessity of shipment of the valuable paper to Washington.

In preparing for this payment, the British Government has resorted to various expedients to provide the ecessary dollars, making heavy purchases in the foreign exchange marcet, acquiring the balances of other lovernments, and shipping gold. The accumulation of Liberty bonds has been carried out under cover and in such a way as to fit in with the operations of the United States Governnent's sinking funds.

It is understood a substantial balance against the June, 1924, payment, already has been built and that purwill begin shortly in the Liberty Bond market.

The Marrying Province

WINNIPEG, Dec. 20 .- (Can. Press) -Manitoba is perhaps the most marrying province in Canada. No other province is quite so addicted to its young men and women entering into the happy state although there be more marriages performed in some of the other provinces. For instance, in Ontario there were some 24,871 marriages in 1921. But even that only gave Ontario a rate of 8.5 marriages per thousand of its population of 610,000. There must be something about Saskatchewan not conducive to giving in marriage. Its marriage rate in 1921 was low. It is interesting, also, to note that more than half of the brides and grooms married in Western Canada were not Canadian porn. The only province in Canada in which practically all those married that year were Canadian born was Prince Edward Island. Of those born outside of Canada, Alberta had the largest percentage of grooms and British Columbia the largest percent-
