MERCURY OFFICE, Oct. 8. For the past week the market has been very lively, every department being well supplied. As may be expected at this season of the year, the largest receipts are those of barley, the price of which fell to 85 cents per bushel during the latter part of last week, but has risen again to from 88 to 90 cents per bushel, with a steady sale at these figures. In the price of wheat there has been a decline of from 5 to 7 cents per bushel since our last issue. Coarse grain is well supplied and very good prices are paid. Peas having risen about 7 cents during the past week, while in oats there has been a very slight decline. Dressed hogs are readily bought up at from \$7.50 to \$8 per cwt. A lot of live pigs sold to-day at \$6.00 per cwt. live weight.
