MILLER BILL KILLED IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Lancaster and Mr. Miller, the former accusing the promoter of the bill of being insincere in his efforts to regulate gambling by his refusal to accept Mr. McColl's amendments, which obliterated hand books and pool rooms.

Mr. Borden, before the motion was put, asked if any further time of the house would be taken up with the matter. Mr. Miller stated that everyone wanted an early prorogation, and he thought that the house had done very well with two days' talk in the matter. He could not, however, promise that a further opportunity for anti-race track gambling legislation would be given this session. He did not think they should be asked to do more than was done. In the event of the two sides effecting a compromise something might possibly be done. The premier, however, could not say anything definite on this point. Every one should be anxious to facilitate business. The motion to report progress carried, amid loud cheers, especially from the French Canadian contingent, who have waited faithfully for two days to give the house the opportunity to deal with the matter.

The result of tonight's votes showed there was hope for the Miller bill as drafted. He expected to report progress tomorrow, but entirely allowed up by the McColl amendments and prevent the amendments from carrying. Mr. Miller quit the saddle, thereby calling down severe strictures on his conduct from those who really desired some restrictions on the race-track betting, which the McColl amendment bill contained.

Bringling 100 Mares Here from France

Mr. George Lane Importing Thoroughbred Percherons to be Placed on Ranch Near Brooks

Mr. George Lane has made arrangements for importing 100 thoroughbred Percheron mares from France. They will arrive in Alberta in August and will be placed at Mr. Lane's ranch at Brooks. Mr. Lane is acting in this enterprise with Gordon, Ironsides and Bares.

Mr. Lane has already on his Bar U ranch the largest band of Percheron horses on the continent. The addition of this band will be a great effect upon the Alberta horse.

Mr. Lane has adopted the policy of the higher class horse on account of the higher price of land. He believes that while it might be well to go in for the poorer horse when land was cheap, that now the time has come when the horseman has got to handle the better animal.

Mr. Lane's foreman, Mr. Plimington, who has charge of all his horses, will go to France in a few weeks and bring out this excellent band of pure bred.

When Salt Sea Rolled Over Prairie

The Calgary Natural Gas Company at a Depth of 3700 Feet Came Upon Salt Water—Other Wells to be Sunk

The Calgary Natural Gas company, after boring 3,700 feet for gas, has suddenly and unexpectedly come upon salt water. Though this was unexpected it brings to mind the fact that that depth is just a little below the sea level. In the countless years ago this part of the world was covered by the sea. The well caved at the bottom and put an end to further digging for the present at least.

A thorough test is now being made of the gas as a fuel by the Calgary brewery. At the conclusion of the test it is the intention to sink other wells in the vicinity.

Arrangements are already made for a well at Glendon. This will be one of a series of wells from that town to the city. It is likely that a well will be started in London in a short time.

LONDON CAPITALISTS BUYING COAL NEAR EDMONTON

Thirty Five Miles East of The Town On The G. T. P. Line

Edmonton, April 7.—A syndicate of London capitalists have purchased a half section of rich coal lands on the G. T. P. 35 miles east of here, and are preparing to develop the property this summer with modern machinery. A representative has been in the city for some time completing arrangements. The property is said to contain three million tons of the best lignite. Modern machinery is to be imported and development carried along on an extensive scale.

Express Rates.

Ottawa, April 7.—Weather when an express company files special tariff of rates, it can be compared to extend such tariff to other commodities than those specified and to other points, was the focus of the press rates hearing yesterday afternoon before the railway commission. Judge Mabee reserved decision. The point came up on a query by the board as to why low freight rates might not be extended to other commodities.
