Victor Dubruil, representing the fed-eral department of labor, made an explanation of the act and said that this idea had been considered before, but was regarded as impossible owing to the fact that thirty or more cases might be under hearing from coast to coast. He denied the allegation of some speak. ers that politics could creep into such appointments and said in nearly all cases where the government was called on to make nomination. it was favorable to the workers. He also asserted that the department was friendly wards labor organizations so long as they were properly organized. Ultimately this resolution was with-

drawn, another resolution approved of the action of the department in publishing reports on labor organiza but asked that greater accuracy be ex-ercised as, according to one speaker, current reports include the name of the unions, defunct for some years. A proposition by Delegate Chambers,

Toropto, to send greetings to the Do-minion Council in session at Guelph created considerable opposition. P. H. Simard, Quebec, read an extract from a Labor Day souvenir published at Que-bec, the tone of which was inimical to Canadian unions and this together with other objections from Nova Scotla delegates resulted in the proposition being withdrawn.



London, Sept. 13 .- The new British Copyright Act is now in operation. It provides that all British publications shall obtain copyright automatically-although colonial works will still require to be registered. The phrase "Entered at Stationers' H 1." will con-sequently, not be seen on new British publications.

The famous institution, which dates back to 1670, was opened for the last time for registering purposes on June 31. Over 16,000 books, paintings, drawings and photographs were regis-tired at the hall last year, yet few Londoners know where this famous building is situated.

It is in a narrow passage off Lud-gate Hill, and was built in 1670, to replace an eastler building burnt in the great fire of 1660, when over \$\$1,000,000 worth of books was destroyed.

The Stationers' Company was incor-porated by royal charter in 1657, and its record from 1576 to the present day are intact and are of great interest and importance to students of English literature


