LacrosseHamilton Tigers May Play
Their Namesakes In Calgary

Famous Rugby Team of Eastern Canada Arranging Tour—
Calgary Tigers Will Consider at Once—September 27 Will Be the Date.

PROVIDED the financial end of the deal can be satisfactorily arranged the Hamilton Tigers, one of the most famous rugby organizations in the Dominion, will play their namesakes, the Calgary Tigers, in Calgary on Saturday, September 27. Sep Dumoulin, a former star of the Hamilton Tigers and at present vice-president of the Western Canada Rugby union, is arranging a tour of the Tigers throughout the west before the eastern season starts. The tour will include games with Winnipeg, Regina, Moose Jaw and Calgary.

The secretary of the Alberta Rugby Football union yesterday received a communication from Mr. Dumoulin asking if it would be possible to get a date in Calgary. The members of the local executive, who could be communicated with last night, were all heartily in favor of the scheme and a meeting of the Tiger club will be called immediately to finally settle the matter. If the local rugby men do not decide to do it, the Tigers will in all probability play in Edmonton but the locals will have the first call.

The only thing which stands in the way of the visit of the Hamilton Tigers to the west is the guarantee of \$1,000 which is necessary. However, when the Winnipeg Rowing club played the Tigers here for the western Canada championship this amount was raised with little difficulty, and the visit of the Hamilton team to the city is of ever greater importance.

The visit of the Hamilton Tigers will mark an epoch in the history of rugby in the west. They are the first eastern team to even seriously contemplate such a move, the reason in the past being that there were no teams in the west that could give an eastern team a run for the money. But within the past three years rugby has improved to such an extent that the east has been forced to recognize the west as a factor for the championship.

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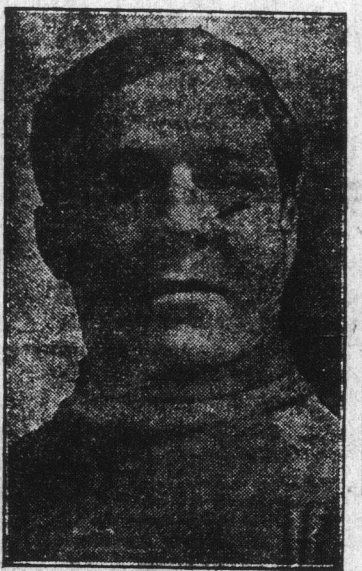

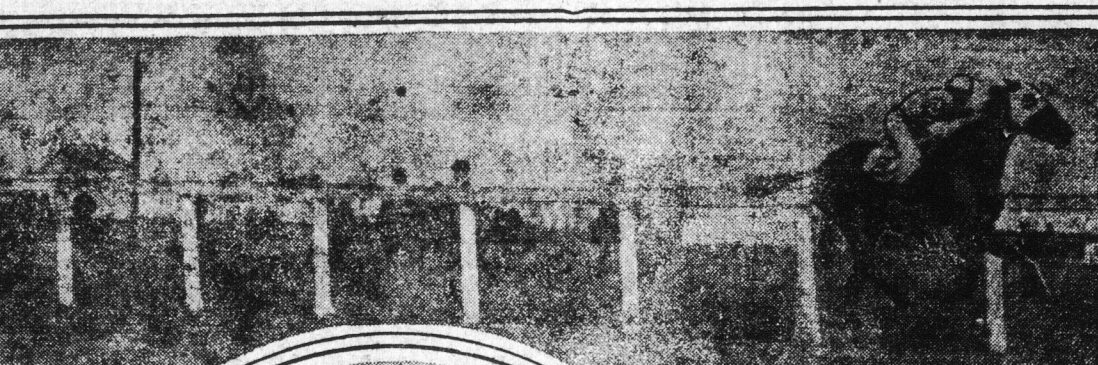

ONE-THIRD of the season in both big leagues is now over and some sort of line has been furnished on the strength of the different teams by the intersectional series concluded two weeks ago. Of the two races, that of the American league is being run nearer to the ante-season dope of the experts than that of the National. The only decided upset is that of the world's champion, Boston Red Sox, whose showing to date has been inexplicable. All their pitchers, including the great Joe Wood, have been erratic since the season's start and the team as a whole has not been hitting or fielding up to last season's standard. Manager Knickerbocker has been out of the game and it may be that the Red Sox will take a decided brace upon his return to first base. The Athletics, world's champions of 1910 and 1911, have made a splendid showing up to date and since their return home from the first western trip have captured 14 out of 15 games, and have won 12 straight games by defeating Detroit for the fourth time yesterday. If they keep up this pace longer they will be so far ahead of the other clubs with the exception of Cleveland that all interest will be taken out of the race.

The Cleveland Naps have certainly shown surprising speed so far this season. However, they will be put to the acid test during the next two weeks by playing the Athletics, Boston and Washington on the latter's grounds in the east. If they stay up where they are, even if by a decreased percentage, until they return to their own ground, it will seem as though they are the team the Athletics will have to beat out if they are to divide up the world's series money in the fall. But for the unfortunate illness of third baseman, Foster, Washington would have undoubtedly been further up in the race at this time. Prince Albert, June 6.—The Australians, in their opening game here today, overwhelmed the Prince Albert eleven by a score of four hundred and seventy-two for seven wickets against seventy-eight all out for the local combination. Play was carried on in ideal cricket weather, the pitch being fine and the sunshine brilliant. The visitors batted first and at the adjournment for luncheon had completed a total of 191 for three wickets, 80 of the runs coming to C. G. McCarty's bat. In the afternoon C. W. Bardaley ran up a score of 95 and in a brilliant innings lasting less than three quarters of an hour P. J. Arnold reached the century when at 101. At four o'clock the innings was declared closed for seven wickets. The innings of the Prince Albert eleven was over in an hour and a half, the batsmen being unable to meet the deadly bowling of the Cornstalks. The best stand was made when Captain Kenneth Weaver and R. W. Kirby were together. The former scored 21, including two boundaries when he marched, being bowled by A. Malley.
