A Chicago Street Car Plunges Into the River-Hairbreadth Escape of the Passengers.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—"Jump for your lives, we are going into the river!" The driver of a Lincoln avenue car of the North Chicago Street Railway Company threw open the front door of his car at 12:35 this morning, and with a face as white as snow communicated these appalling words to his passengers, a dozen or more in number. The passengers made a wild rush for the doors. Just as the last man sprang from the step the car and horse went over the brink and plunged into the river. The Clark street bridge had been turned to allow the passage of a barge just as the car came into sight on the viaduct. The grade from the viaduct to the bridge is steep. As the car reached the edge of the viaduct the driver applied the brake. It refused to work, and the car began to slide down the grade, gaining in velocity with every foot toward the river. When within 50 feet of the brink the driver threw himself directly against the brake. The chain snapped and the car could not be stopped. The conductor sprang into the car, shouting to the passengers to jump and shaking the sleeping ones. One man awoke just as the car rocked on the verge.
