THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, May 11-11 p.m.—The de-
pression which was south of the lakes dur-
ing Saturday has passed away to the At-
lantic, and to-day the pressure has been
high throughout Canada. To-night there
is a depression over Southern Dakota, mov-
ing eastward. The weather has been
generally fine and pleasant from the lakes
to the Atlantic, and unsettled, with cool
northeast winds, in the Northwest Terri-
tory. Minimum temperatures last night:
Calgary, 24°; Qu'Appelle, 30°; Winnipeg,
30°; Toronto, 36°; Montreal, 36°;
Quebec, 34°; Halifax, 46°.

A Well-Known Resident's Death.

Mr. John Hodgins, 38 years of age and a

deceased was well-known as a man of up-
right character, and his long illness was
borne with great patience. The funeral will
take place on Thursday to Woodland Ceme-
tery.

Archbishop Walsh at St. Peter's.

One of the largest congregations seen at
St. Peter's Cathedral in a long time was
that of Sunday morning at high mass, when
Archbishop Walsh, of Toronto, preached
for the first time since his removal from
this city to the Diocese of Toronto. The
Archbishop took as the basis of his remarks
part of the discourse delivered by Jesus to
his disciples prior to his crucifixion on the
cross, which they were to enjoy when he
would be taken from them and the Holy
Ghost would descend from the Father.
"Jesus, in telling his disciples of the com-
forts that would come to them," said the
speaker, "spoke the grandest truth in the
Bible, a truth which was to be a comfort in
life and a stay in death, and though the
path would be thorny and the way dreary,
still they had Christ's blessed promise, 'It is
expedient that I should go away, but I will
send the comforter, and he will abide with
you forever.' Did they receive the Holy
Ghost? They did. While the apostles were
in an upper room in Jerusalem, we read,
the Holy Spirit descended upon them, and
on the church and in the hearts of God's
children it has abided ever since." The
preacher referred to the mission of the
church and the work being done by it, and
exhorted his hearers as members of the true
church on earth to continue to live after
the life of the Holy Ghost—lives of purity
and with charity to all men.

Rev. Principal Austin on Prophecy.

At the Wellington Street Methodist
Church yesterday special educational
services were held. Rev. Principal Austin,
of Toronto, preached in the morning, and
Principal Austin, of St. Thomas, in the
evening. Principal Austin took for his
text, H. Peter, I, 19. "We have
also a more sure word of prophecy where
