A Breezy Reply to Dr. J. B. Campbell

Attitude of Organized Labor in Regard to Civic Affairs.

I was greatly surprised in reading

To the Editor of the "Advertiser":

your report of the proceedings of No. 1 committee of the Board of Education to see that Dr. J. B. Campbell has so far forgotten to play the part of a gentleman as to make a venomous and unfair attack upon myself and the organ-ized labor unions of the city. There are some people who always develop a bad case of swelled head when they happen to own a little bit of real estate, and they think its possession entitles them to ride the high horse and dictate to the rest of the people how they shall act in regard to questions that directly affect their interests. As regards his statements re myself, they are ut-terly false and unreliable. The doctor should be careful when he has statements to make that they are true, and when he goes out of the way to bring my private affairs to the notice of the public I tell him to his teeth that he is not unfair, but impertinent, and that it is my concern, not his, as to how much rent I pay. In the first place, Mr. Editor, I am an owner of real estate in this city, on which I pay taxes, and I am also one of the heaviest share-holders in Labor Hall, valued at \$1,-100. I have always paid rent, even at Labor Hall, but the money so paid has been handed over for philanthropic work in connection with organized labor. As to my not being of any use to the city, I beg leave to state that I do not consider the doctor is unbiased enough to judge. The class for whom I have worked have honored me in every way that lay in their power, and if it has not made me better off financially, I appreciate their confidence and respect, and thank heaven that I have earned every enemy who yaps at my heels. In regard to his attack upon organized labor, he shows that he lives 300 years behind his time. Nature made a serious mistake in developing him so late. He would be in his ele-ment at the time of the dark ages, when men were burned at the stake for daring to have ideas of their own. I suppose it would be all right if the toilers would consent to work and sleep and do just as the privileged parties dictated, but we are living in the day when the men who have builded our cities have made up their minds to have a say in running them. It is evident that the work of organized labor in London has begun to tell, and some people who own a little real estate are afraid that they will have to pay the taxes they don't pay at present. It is true, organized labor pledged the aldermanic candidates at the recent elec-tion, but they did not buttonhole them in corners, as some other people did. As electors of the city, workingmen have rights, and they don't think that a meeting of the R. E. O. P. A. with three members in attendance should have a monopoly of sending petitions to the City Council. The doctor does not take the trouble to say what bad measures the Trades and Labor Council have advocated, and for a very good reason; he cannot. We have asked for a 60-hour clause in the electric street railway agreement, also that a standard and fair rate of wages be paid on all contracts for municipal works. If Dr. Campbell is in favor of workmen working sixteen hours per day, and that the rate of wages on municipal work he at the lowest point he has a right in his opinion, but he must concede the same right to those who differ from him. It is true, we advocated the publication of the assessment roll, and the people to whom the doctor is opposed, and who are real estate owners, said, "Yes, go ahead." Well, we don't apologize for it. If the doctor thinks that they will hurt him, so much the worse for him. Now, Mr. Editor, as the working

classes of the city are in the majority, and as all taxes are drawn directly from their labor, it seems to me that it is only just that they should have equal privileges in being heard at our council chambers with any other section of the community. We live in a day when men are thinking, and we cannot bind down the masses to the condition they occupied in bygone years. Personally, when I have waited on public bodies to draw their attention to important questions I have represented not myself, but the organized labor of the city, and other persons speaking with me have been in the same position. It makes no difference whether these individuals own real estate or not. They are sent to represent a body which com-prises many property holders in their ranks, and 1 may say we have always been received in a courteous and gen-tlemanly manner whenever we have gone. I am pleased to know that the best of feeling prevails at present among the business men, the clergy and organized labor, and that in no previous time in the history of the city have the different elements that comprise its population been brought so close together as during the present

on your space. I will attend to the doctor at further length in the next number to pass a remedial law or leave it of the Industrial Banner, but would say before concluding that I understand where this attack has come from. Ever since the time the R. E. O. P. A. was formed they have used their best endeavors to try and use the Trades and Labor Council as a lever to further their personal ends. They have gotten out petitions, and not having bone to sign them first themselves they have brought them to us and tried to get us to father them. They tried to use us in connection with their waterworks fight. They insinuated that we should join hands with them and "bust" the City Council. Some or their members said they would back us up in getting the assessment rolls published, but it was only to get on our good side. The Trades Council, however, had a mind of its own, and it refused to pull the R. E. O. P. A. chestnuts out of the fire. It let them run their own petitions, and it let them settle their own fight. and they have made - pretty mess of everything they have undertaken. This has raised their bile so had that even the pills of their fellow-member, Dr. Campbell, have been poweriess to allay the irritation. Now, Mr. Editor, I know whereof I speak, and am prepared to supply names, if necessary, and I think it is time some people were shown up. As a mechanic who earns an honest living, and who enjoys no special privileges such as legislators nave bestowed on the profession followed by Dr. Campbell, and which have been gained after lobbying and buttonholing, I contend it comes with bad grace from such a man to talk about intimidation, especially when the same procession went before the City Council to oppose a reso-lution of the Board of Health to intimidate the council to throw over that re-port (last year). This, of course, was only business. Now, Mr. Editor, in conclusion, let me say, the workingmen of this city have a certain power, and they know it; moreover, they will use it without any impertinent advice from Dr. Campbell. When they have a measure to advocate they will advocate it. and as long as they feel they are right they will go ahead. Of course, I sup-pose Dr. Campbell will not be manly enough to acknowledge his mistake All the same, I want him to understand that I am a real estate owner and pay rent, and if he will call at my residence. 427 Grey street, I will give him the information he so badly needs.
