TRUNCATED BY THE TAIL ENDERS

Charlie Maddock's ball players did very well yesterday for a team reported to be on the ragged edge of dissolution. The dissolution did not seem on their side at all. They played a snappy ball, and won the game before it was half over.

The local management evidently thought Toronto was, as usual, London's pie, and Seifert was put in the box, just to give him a little practice. Toronto practiced on him to the extent of five singles, a double, a triple and three bases on balls in the first four innings. Then Mr. Johnston relieved him, and had he had proper support the visitors would have been blanked for the remaining five innings.

Mr. McGinnell, the attenuated gentleman who delivered hot stuff for Toronto, performed his duties with neatness and dispatch, on the whole. When he did offer the Toronto team the Londoners very generously refused to take advantage of them. In the second inning, for instance, McGinnell gave them three chances, and two singles, but London only claimed one.

London did that for him, Seifert led off with a beautiful double to left field, in his ambition to reach third, he died within a foot of the base. Then Greer, Greer and Johnston took bases on balls in succession. The batters thought McGinnell was "going," he stayed. Kershaw fanned the air, and the bases were still full. Great things were expected of him, but he had been giving the ball the Fitzsimmons knock-out every time. Frank cracked a hit one to Dodson, who merely touched his base and put Greer out on the forced run. Three bases on balls, a double and one run made a very disappointing combination.

Toronto's lead in the fourth was obtained by Maddock's single, McGinnell's double, and Seifert's double and Sippi's error. After that Toronto's runs were secured more by good luck than good management. In the seventh, Gunther, who went behind in the fifth to backstop Johnston, dropped Pfeiffer's third strike, allowing him to score and Pfeiffer to reach first. In the ninth the runs were scored on McGinnell's single by Dark and Pfeiffer, both of whom reached first on errors by Snyder and Connolly. The score:

THE PITCHING GUN.

Princeton, N. J., June 12.—Prof. Hinton's patent baseball pitching gun is a decided success. Eight strike-outs, one base on balls, one wild pitch and four safe hits is the record in three innings in the first fair test of the machine's practicability in an actual game. Nines representing the Ivy Club and Tiger Inn, two of Princeton's social clubs, played a match, game, using the gun to pitch the ball.

The gun is discharged by the batter, using the gun to pitch the ball. The speed with which the ball is thrown is regulated by compressed air, and projected by a spring from the catcher's mouth. The gun is a rotary motion to the sphere when discharged, producing a curve in any direction, according to the position of the projecting prongs is changed. There is but one serious defect in the operation of the machine that will prevent its use in games, and that is the long time required for reloading. This was especially noticed in the case of the gun, because the intercepting plate was out of order, and the frequent delays thereby necessitated did not allow the game to be finished. Three innings only were played. During the first inning the batter was standing near the plate, and the big curves caused them to jump back; but as the gun threw strikes in every inning, they plucked up courage, stood closer to the plate, and succeeded occasionally in making safe hits. The game was interrupted by the novelty of seeing the pitcher's box occupied by a machine. The Ivy Club won by a score of 7 to 3.
