The remains of the late ex-Conductor John Battle were followed to the grave yesterday afternoon by a large number of his friends, society brethren and old railway comrades. The Independent Order of Oddfellows had charge of the funeral and turned out in honor of the memory of their late esteemed brother. The church service was conducted by Rev. W. J. Clark, and that of the order by Bros. John Kirkpatrick and A. C. Stewart. Bros. S. Mason, R. Butler, T. Burdette, A. Davis, J. J. Reed and H. Strong were the pallbearers. The last resting place was the Presbyterian Cemetery, to which the Oddfellows marched on foot.

Funeral of the Late Engineer Elliott.
The funeral of the late Engineer John W. Elliott took place Saturday afternoon from the family residence, 371 King street, and was largely attended. The Canadian Order of Foresters, the Chosen Friends and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, of which organizations deceased was a member, were represented. The pallbearers were Henry Cronin and George Phillips, of the Locomotive Firemen; Caleb Hurker and Thomas Trevelyan, of the Chosen Friends; and George Burton and A. Kirkpatrick, of the C. O. F. Rev. H. C. Speller was the officiating clergyman.

A Child Rescued.
Joseph Long, a young man living at 166 Clarence street, did a brave deed yesterday. Aired, the 4-year-old son of Mr. George Pellow, 73 Colborne street, fell off the bank into the river at Clarke's bridge about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. In a moment Long, who was near the spot, plunged into the cold water, Sunday clothes and all, after the helpless child and swam with him to shore. The water here is about ten feet deep, but for the quick and plucky

rescue the little fellow would have been in a watery grave. The lad was handed over to P. C. McDonald, who took him home where the worst experts for the ducking. Those who saw the affair are loud in their praise of Long's action.

One of the Burke-Wilson Gang.
The boy Charles Hamilton, who toured the country with the Burke-Wilson gang, is once more enjoying the sweet pleasures of liberty. He started away willingly enough with the policeman from Preston for Berlin, there to serve out a 60 days' sentence, which he avoided last summer through the agility of Burke in rescuing him from the lockup. The constable fell asleep while the train was nearing Brampton, and taking advantage of the opportunity the youth jumped as the train slowed up at the station without attracting attention. After that he cut the chain by hammering it on the rails with a spike. Hamilton is now en route to Chicago.

A Shocking Railway Fatality.
A fatal accident occurred Saturday afternoon at the G. T. R. station, St. Thomas, by which a popular railroad official lost his life. Conductor Joseph Hopperton, who runs on the Air Line, was busy checking his freight train, and, holding an umbrella up, did not see the approaching yard engine. The wheels passed over him, almost severing both legs from his body. He was taken to the Amasa Wood Hospital and lingered until 4:30 o'clock Sunday morning, when death relieved him. Deceased was between 35 and 40 years of age, and leaves a wife and seven children. He resided in St. Thomas, and was held in the highest esteem by his citizens and by the railway community. Mr. John Delaney, night yardmaster of the G. T. R., this city, was a brother-in-law of deceased.

The Salvation Army.
The Salvation Army will be shortly having their annual week of thanksgiving, prayer and self-denial, which is from Nov. 6 to 12, inclusive. Special meetings will be held every night in the local barracks. One special feature of the self-denial week is an appeal which is made to every individual member and follower of the Salvation Army to deny themselves some article of food or clothing, or in some way, so that without lessening their regular contributions they may be able to help the self-denial fund. An appeal is also made from house to house. The Salvation Army in Canada and Newfoundland hope to raise the sum of \$20,000 this year for the self-denial fund, the money to be apportioned in the following manner: Rescue and social operations, \$5,000; relief of sick and wounded officers and enlisted men, \$5,000; training of officers, \$2,500; assistance of small corps in their indebtedness to territorial headquarters, \$5,000; French work, \$800; general extension, \$2,000. The Salvation Army in England have recently held their annual week of thanksgiving, which took place in September, and news has been received that the amount will exceed by 25 per cent, anything that has gone before.

Death of Fred McMillan.
At 6:45 on Saturday evening the death occurred of Mr. Fred McMillan, a well-known young resident of this city. He succumbed to that dread disease, consumption. It is just one year ago since he was taken ill, through an attack of internal hemorrhage. Several eminent physicians consulted on his case. A journey to California was taken and he remained there until some months ago, so spent without beneficial results. Since returning home he gradually sank and although his recovery was known to be hopeless his death was not looked for so soon. His demise is a sad one and his bereaved friends are in London and Western Ontario were numerous and they will deeply regret the loss of his death. He was a traveler for Messrs. Dickinson, Nicholson & Co., of this city, and just before his sickness had accepted a new position with a Montreal firm. He has one brother, George A., who formerly was a traveler for the same house in London, but latterly has been with a Toronto firm. Deceased had previously lived with his brother, but after his return and his brother's removal took up his home with Mr. Daniel Lester, Mr. George McGillivray's father-in-law. The relatives will have widespread sympathy in their bereavement. No one on looking at deceased's fine broad-shouldered form a little over a year ago would have predicted his untimely end. He was a member of St. John's Lodge, 2004, A. F. and A. M., and of the Western Ontario Travelers' Association. The remains will be interred in Hyde Park Cemetery on Tuesday.

Closure of a Pastorate.
With yesterday's sermons and the services at the Young People's meeting to-night Rev. H. C. Speller closes his pastorate at Adelaide Street Baptist Church, extending over the brief period of two years and seven months. Yesterday's discourses bore no particular relation to the severance of pastor and people. "Indeed," said Mr. Speller, "I could hardly trust myself to say the things usually said in a farewell sermon. He desired to end his ministry in London as he began it, and as he had endeavored to carry it through, in preaching Christ and him crucified. Yesterday morning's sermon was the concluding one of a series which Mr. Speller had been giving from the eighth chapter of Romans, and brought to a fitting close, thoughtful and lucid exposition of that remarkable chapter to a fitting close, his text being the 31st verse: "What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us who can be against us?" Paul having in the earlier portion of the chapter set forth the glorious privileges and possibilities of those who by being "in Christ Jesus" had attained to conship of God, looking, as from an eminence over the whole surging prospect, gives vent to his feelings in the exclamation of the text. It was no mere sentimentalism on his part, but as if standing before the "great white throne," and taking in the overpowering scene, words failed to express his astonishment, and the only answer is, "If God be for us who can be against us?" God, said the preacher, is for us in the entirety of his being. He is the only one who had a right to be angry with the sinner, and if he were satisfied who the sinner should be? The greatest gift of God having been bestowed, all other things were assured to the believer. "All things are yours, and ye are Christ's, and Christ is God's," and he who alone has the right to condemn sits at the right hand of God the Father.

Mr. Speller's evening discourse was powerful and touching, his text being one that he preached from on the first Sunday of his pastorate. "For I determined not to know anything among you save Jesus Christ and him crucified," I Cor., II, 2. The reverend gentleman was listened to with marked attention throughout by large and sympathetic audiences. The choir under Miss Rendell's leadership, sang appropriate selections with taste and feeling, a feature of the evening service, being the quartet by the Misses Minnie and Edie Hartson and Messrs. Moorhead and Maynard.

"Mr. Potter of Texas" is an attraction just booked for London and will appear in a couple of weeks.

"The Hand of Fate" Company play in Port Huron to-night, and will then come back to Ontario, playing in Petrolia, Strathroy and Dunnville this week.

William Barrett, the English actor, and his leading lady, Maud Jeffers, an American, arrived in New York on Friday, and will open in Philadelphia on Monday next. He will be seen in London late in the season.

Wm. West, of Primrose & West, who was married at his own handsome residence near New York city on Thursday, took as his third wife Miss Emma Hanley. She will be remembered as the actress who played "Nadly" in London in November, 1889.

Sara Lord Bailey, the elocutionist, comes to London highly recommended by press and public. Her American and Canadian tours have been rewarded with great success. The plan for Miss Bailey's recital on Nov. 3 at Victoria Hall opens to-day at C. F. Colwell's.

Margaret Mather when in Toronto two years ago made an arrangement with the Sisters of Loretto, so they claim, for the board and tuition of her niece, and now refuses to pay for the same—\$383.92. On Friday the master in chambers made an order shortening the time for appearance and defence by the defendants.

Felix Morris announces that he will launch out next season for himself as a star. Last Monday Mr. Morris formally notified Manager Cecil Clay, of the Rosina Vokes Company, of his intentions, in order that Mr. Clay might have ample time to look after his successor next year.

When Miss Vokes' season closes in New York next May Mr. Morris will bid her farewell and go to his summer home at Oceanonovoe, Wis., to rest and prepare for his own tour. The Rosina Vokes Company are booked for London.

Katie Emmett's great play, "The Waifs of New York," is one of the strongest plays before the public, and tells a simple, touching story of the trials and sufferings of two friendless and homeless waifs cast adrift upon the world, and of their subsequent rise to prosperity.
