Dismay Felt in the Metropolis

At the Terrible Nature of the News From China.

Late Telegrams Indicate an Increasingly Serious State of Affairs—Shanghai and Other Large Cities May Be Involved—Fears of a General Uprising Against the European Element—"Wondering if We Are at War."

London, Tuesday, July 17—3:53 a.m.

Up to this hour there has been no further news received regarding the reported massacre at Pekin from any source. In the House of Commons last evening, beyond an admission that there was no ground for hoping that the report was not true, Mr. William St. John Brodric, parliamentary secretary to the foreign office, had nothing to communicate.

An unusual hush fell upon the chamber when the subject came up. A few members doffed their hats, but otherwise there was no demonstration. No question was put to Lord Salisbury in the House of Lords, probably by a preconcerted arrangement, it being considered at the present state of affairs it would be only embarrassing to force the minister to make a statement.

NEED FOR MORE WARSHIPS. Telegrams from Shanghai and Chefoo indicate an increasingly serious state of affairs. It is alleged that the foreign consuls at Shanghai have cabled their governments that there is urgent need of more warships to protect that port, owing to the menacing attitude of the Chinese, and the temptation to loot the vast stores of merchandise recently accumulated there. It seems that the Chinese have already threatened to fire the great oil tanks on the Pao Tung side of the city.

PROSPECTS OF A GENERAL RISING. From Chefoo comes the report that the entire adult male population of the three provinces of Chi Li, Shan Si and Shan Tung are massing to defend Pekin. In the conviction that the powers mean war. There is little doubt that a further check of the allies at Tien Tsin would be the signal for a general anti-foreign rising throughout China.

THE JAPS SANGUINE. The Japanese officers are still confident of their ability to reach Pekin before the roads become impassable, but the European commanders believe an advance will be impossible before September.

AT NEW CHANG. Fighting is said to be imminent at New Chwang, where the Boxers are threatening the foreign settlement. The Russians have barricaded the streets and loopholed the houses of the foreigners. The banks have removed their valuables to Port Arthur.

Perhaps the most serious among the many reports from Shanghai is the rumor that since the massacre at Pekin five Chinese regiments have been ordered south, with instructions to make Chung Han Po, at the head of the Grand Canal, the objective point for

the southward extension of the Boxer movement.

BRITAIN'S PRECEDENCE. The Times says it is taken for granted in diplomatic circles that when the Chinese crisis is settled, Great Britain will retain the right to nominate the inspector of Chinese customs.

DISMAY IN LONDON. London, July 16.—The Associated Press Tien Tsin dispatch announcing the repulse of the allies was the first news the foreign office had received of the occurrence, and produced a feeling of dismay. Mr. William St. John Brodric, the parliamentary secretary of the foreign office, had left the office and prepared to give the House of Commons a rather satisfactory account of the operations at Tien Tsin. The serious import of the Associated Press dispatches was immediately communicated to him.

Regarding the eventual solution of the crisis and the length of the time the troops will take to reach Pekin there was not a glimmer in the minds of British officials. "All we can do," said one of the most responsible officials, "is to hope for the best, and pray that Japanese troops may move quickly. Nothing has passed regarding the general situation of the powers since we agreed to ask Japan to do the major part of the work, and nothing is likely to be done until a repetition of today's bad news compels every power to send proportionate reinforcements."

With reference to the Tien Tsin dispatch quoting the complaints of British refugees, the foreign office stated that no instructions had been issued to Admiral Seymour not to take on board British subjects; in fact, all his instructions implied otherwise, and they were unable to understand the conditions reported.

The government discredits the report that in the retreat of the Pekin column Admiral Seymour's wounded were killed by their comrades, in order that they might not be tortured by the Chinese.

BELIEVES THE WORST. Berlin, July 16.—At the foreign office here there is no question as to the correctness of the Chinese news of the massacre of foreigners in Pekin. Regarding Tien Tsin, the foreign office's latest dispatches from Admiral Bendenham declare that the situation had improved, as reinforcements continued arriving. The foreign office, while deeply deploring the horrible events at Pekin, expresses confidence that "henceforth the powers' solidarity of interests will assume perfect harmony."

The foreign office further stated that Dr. Munim Von Schwarzerstein (appointed minister to China in succession to the late Baron Von Ketteler) would proceed to China, notwithstanding the latest developments there. The German government, considering unlimited telegraphic connection between the Chinese minister to Germany and China incompatible just now with Germany's interests, today issued orders inhibiting Chinese legation dispatches.

The correspondent here of the Associated Press has received private information from London that a letter was received there from Lady Claude Macdonald (the wife of the British ambassador at Pekin), written while the situation was growing threatening, saying that all the ladies of the legation had supplied themselves with poison.

"ARE WE AT WAR?" London, July 16.—The foreign office has received no advice today from China. Although Lord Salisbury, premier, and minister for foreign affairs, does not doubt that Sir Claude Macdonald, the British minister at Pekin, has been murdered, he has not yet taken any steps regarding international relations as regards China. There is at present no inclination to give to the Chinese minister his passports. Lord Salisbury has seen or heard nothing of this functionary for several days. In fact, not since his lordship made the request that he transmit a message to Sir Claude Macdonald. The Chinese minister agreed, but nothing further has been heard of him.

An official at the foreign office said today: "The Associated Press today: 'We are still wondering whether we are at war with China. Till we ascertain we cannot take any action against its diplomatic representative. The whole thing is so ghastly, so utterly unprecedented, that we are at a loss what course to follow except send to China as many troops as we can spare.'"

Since the definite news of the massacre at Pekin has been received no communications have passed between the powers regarding the necessity for further action or the advisability of declaring war upon the Chinese Government.

MISSION AT HUNAN DESTROYED. Rome, July 17.—The Italian consul at Shanghai cables that the Italian mission in Hunan has been destroyed and Bishop Fano and two missionaries killed. He also reports that the Italian missions in Honan and Huppo have been assaulted.

ONE FAMILY SAFE. Lancaster, Pa., July 16.—A cable dispatch was received here today from Rev. Charles Leaman, of Leaman Place, this county, stating that he and his family had arrived safely at Taku. Rev. Mr. Leaman has been a mission-

ary in China for 26 years, and it was feared that he had fallen a victim to the Chinese murderers.

HOPE ABANDONED. Washington, D. C., July 16.—Without exception today the foreign representatives in Washington accepted as practically certain that the foreign legations and ministers at Pekin have been wiped out. At the same time there is not a word of confirmation from any of the foreign offices, and the conclusion is based on the accumulating unofficial data that the slaughter occurred about July 6 or 7. Even among the high Chinese officials hope has been about given up, but they maintain that there is

NO OFFICIAL INFORMATION, and that they are as much in the dark as others.

A degree of excitement reminiscent of the days of the Spanish war prevailed at the state, war and navy departments today. Early in the day came Remy's dispatch conveying the ill tidings from Tien Tsin. The Ninth Infantry is one of the crack regiments of the army, and the terrible story of fatality in its ranks aroused a spirit of fierce indignation and a demand for vengeance among the officers of the army and navy here that could not be repressed. There was a disposition at first to pluck some hope from Remy's statement that the death of Liscum, and in fact, the whole fight at Tien Tsin was nothing more than a "re- port." This hope was dashed by the receipt of the dispatch written on the battlefield.
