THE DUKE AMONG THE RED MEN!

2,500 Redskins Paraded in Paint and Feathers.

Fantastic Dance a Feature of the Occasion—Royal Visitors Keenly Interested—Preparations for the Trip Through Ontario.

Calgary, N. W. T., Sept. 28.—The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York were entertained today by Indians, cowboys and police who pictured northwest frontier life before them with all the dash and color, and they counted the experience one of the most interesting of their Canadian tour.

Their special train arrived here shortly before 10 o'clock, and a delegation of city officials and citizens gave formal greeting to the royal party. The duchess was escorted to a coach and surrounded by a detachment of mounted police, was drawn through the crowded streets to Victoria Park. Mounts were provided for the duke and his staff, and attired in his uniform of the Royal Fusiliers, with the ribbon of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, they rode to the park. At the park three troops of mounted police were drawn up and the duke inspected and reviewed them. The police executed a series of maneuvers, which were splendidly done.

HONORS AND MEDALS. The duke then decorated Inspector J. M. Belcher, of the Mounted Police, with the Order of St. Michael and St. George, won for services in South Africa with the Strachan Horse, and presented service medals to 107 men who served in South Africa. At the head of the service men walked Col. William Herchmer, for many years commander of the Mounted Police, and now superannuated.

THE INDIAN SHOW. After the review and presentation of medals, the royal party rode to Shaganappi Point, where the tepees of 5,000 Blackfoot, Blood, Piigane, Sarcee, Stoney and Cree Indians were pitched. They had gathered from all over the territory to greet the son of their great chief. The Dominion of the Indians was a scene of the occasion, and those who desired wore the paint and feathers of the olden war times. Their camp was pitched on a tableland commanding a view of the valley.

The duke and duchess, with the Countess of Minto, Premier Laurier and the duke's staff, occupied a specially erected stand, and before the chiefs, with their blankets and pipes, sat for the pow-wow. Beside the chiefs, in circular form, were the Indian and girls from the Indian mission schools, and still farther back in another semi-circle were the squaws and papooses, while in the extreme rear were 400 mounted braves. Directed by

Indian Commissioner David Laird, the chiefs presented a beautifully worded address.

AN INDIAN ADDRESS. It was signed by Chiefs White Pup, Running Rabbit and Iron Shield for the Blackfeet; Chiefs Crop Ear, Wolf and Day Chief for the Bloods; Chief Running Wolf for the Piigane; Chief Bullhead for the Sarcees; Chiefs Jacob Bear Paw, John Chetka and Jonas Big Story for the Stoney, and Chiefs Joseph Samson and Mister Jim for the Cree.

After the address Chiefs White Pup, Crop Ear, Running Wolf, Bullhead, Jonas Big Story and Joseph Samson spoke, renewing the old pledges of peace. Their speeches were interpreted to the duke.

FANTASTIC DANCE. The children from the missions sang "God Save the King," and then in strange contrast there was a wild, fantastic dance. The mounted Indians dashed about the plain in an exhibition of wild and reckless riding, following a chief whose partially naked body was painted a bright yellow.

The duke and duchess were greatly interested in the Indians, and, leaving the children, they walked among them. Through the interpreters they conversed with several of them, shaking hands with the chiefs.

Toronto, Sept. 30.—Ever since his return from Great Britain, Premier Ross has been in receipt of advice from all sections of the province assuring him of the splendid work accomplished on the revision of the voters' lists. Never before on behalf of the Liberals has so much attention been given to this important phase of an election contest.

There are yet number of voters' lists courts to be held, and the work in the constituencies regarding these also will receive the closest attention possible, while special regard will be paid the lists wherever the opposition urged "good" lists, as their instructions directed, by the "sound Conservative assessors" and the "clever who are friendly."
