TOOK A BUTTON FROM YOUNG GIRL'S THROAT.

Dr. Roswell Park, Who Attended President McKinley, Performed a Skillful

Buffalo, Nov. 13 .- Dr. Roswell Park removed a large coat button from the throat of Hazel Hetchler, 10 years oid, daughter of Frank J. Hetchler, of Franklinville, N. Y., on Saturday morning, and saved the life of the

About a week ago the little girl placed in her mouth a button which she pulled from her coat. Without noticing the danger she was incurring, she kept the button in her mouth, and after talking to a playmate she finally got it into her throat. Efforts to dislodge it proved futile. A few days afterwards Hazel complained of feeling intense pain whenever she tried to swallow. Her father then became alarmed and brought her to Dr. Park, who, by the use of the X-ray machine, located the button in the

back of the throat. The child was put under chloroform and the button was removed in three minutes. As the button was made of metal the child's throat is in an irritated condition, but it is believed that complete recovery is only a matter of a few days.

A MARTYR TO SCIENCE.

New York, Nov. 13.-A young woman has just been inoculated with virus from a cow suffering from tuberculosis by Dr. George D. Barney, of Third street, Brooklyn. The woman was Miss Emma H. King, of Brooklyn. She offered to submit to this experiment, it was said, in order that the medical profesion might know whether or not Professor Koch's theory that bovine tubercle bacilli cannot affect human beings was correct. The cow from which the virus was taken was inoculated with virus of a consumptive person some time ago by Dr. Barney. Dr. Barney said he was also anxious to prove that persons suffering from consumption in its early stage can be cured by the inhalation of a compound of the phenol group. Should Miss be stricken with consumption as a result of the experiment she will undergo the inhalation treatment.



PEACE RUMORS!

From Almost Every Point Except From Botha's Heacquarters in the Saddle.

London, Nov. 13, 1 a.m.-Peace negotiations are reported from every quarter except from General Botha's headquarters in the saddle. The National Liberal Federation is agitating for a full and explicit declaration of terms from Downing street, but this is a political maneuver directed by the pro-Boers. Messrs. Kruger and Leyds are credited, for the first time, with a willingness to consider something less than actual national independence as a basis for peace, but the rumors from Holland are contradictory and illusory.

ANOTHER PEACE STORY. There is a story that the Boers in arms have approached Lord Kitchener and intimated a desire for peace without reference to Messrs. Kruger, Steyn and Botha, but this is a transparent fiction, started for the purpose of ex-plaining Lord Salisbury's veiled reference to grounds for confidence which he could not lay bare. There can be no peace while 8,000 Boers and Cape rebels hold the field under a dozen or more guerilla leaders.

BOERS CLAIM A SUCCESS. Dr. Leyds' friends, says the Berlin correspondent of the London Times. assert that a British laager, containing remounts for the cavalry now on the way from England, was captured by the Boers. The circumstance that this success of the burghers is not known in London, according to these informants, is due to the fact that it is not the custom of the British to mention

the loss of war material unattended by loss of life. DEWET IN ORANGE COLONY.

Lord Kitchener's last report shows how scattered these forces are, and how narrow is their range of opera-tions. Dewet has reappeared in a quarter of the Orange River Colony where he can co-operate with Botha, and it is surmised that another attempt to invade Natal is impending. BOER DELEGATES AT BERLIN. Dr. Leyds, the diplomatic representative of the Boers, and Mr. Fischer, a Transvaal delegate, are in Berlin. They disayow having any political object, but the idea prevails in certain quarters that it is not accidental that their coming coincides with the outbreak of Anglophobia aroused by Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's speech in Edinburgh. Meetings to protest against the statements made by Mr. Chamberlain continue to be held there Chamberlain continue to be held, there being four at Leipzig, Insterburg, Hamm and Gera. Resolutions were adopted and forwarded to Chancellor Von Buelow.

"SPATCH-COCK" EXPLAINED. London Chronicle: Many people have been wondering how the word "spatch-cock," used by Gen. Buller, comes to mean "sandwiched in between." At a dak-bungalow in India you see a "chicken" running about, and in ten minutes you are eating him "spatch-cocked." He has been slain, dipped in hot water to assist the plucking, and his breast bone flattened down, and is grilled as flat as a chop, without the flesh ever being allowed to cool. He is supposed "eat" less tough in that way than any other.

LIEVED. On Friday 70 policemen, who are now doing special Pan-American duty on the regular force at \$65 per month, will be dismissed. They will lose their jobs not because of any fault of their own but merely because they will not be needed any more. Last spring the common council made a special fund of \$29,250 to be spent on 75 special patrolmen to be employed for the six months beginning May 15. This appropriation was exclusive of the \$150,-000 raised by a bond issue for Pen-American guards, all of which has been spent.
