# MARTINEAU TOOK \$75,000

Approach That Sum.

Ottawa, March 7.—A. Banderus Martineau, the Militia Department defaulter, was again remanded for a week yesterday morning at the request of his counsel, owing to several new charges of forgery being laid. Six new charges were brought before the court this morning by Inspector Hogan, dealing with three checks, on each of which were based charges of forgery and uttering a forged document. The checks were: One for \$13,500, dated Oct. 13, 1902, payable to A. Martineau; one for \$6,700, dated July 7, 1902, ptyable to Charles D. Cote, and one for \$4,355, dated April 26, 1902, payable to Charles D. Cote. The charges previously before the court were of forging and uttering a check for \$9,300, dated July 7, 1902, payable to Charles D. Cote. The charge of breach of trust by a public officer has not yet been presented to the magistrate, although it was one of the earliest prepared. Crown Attorney Ritchie gave to the press a memo. of the alleged forgery of Martineau, by which it appears that it amounted to \$75,705. Checks for \$20,000 were passed through the Sovereign Bank, for \$20,200 through the Sovereign Bank, All of these, except those passed through the Royal Bank, were payable to Charles D. Cote, while the Royal Bank checks were payable to A. Martineau.

#### Car Etiquette in Cincinnati.

#### Artificial Lightning.

Prof. Trowbridge, of Harvard University, says that with his battery of 20,-000 cells, a voltage of about 6,000,000 is obtained, which is at least comparable with that of lightning. With this large battery he is able to get an electric spark about seven feet long. In his experiments he found that a spark of this length, instead of striking water, invariably jumped to some adjacent object. A spark a few inches in length will, however, strike water, but such a spark is not to be compared to light-ning. Beyond 1,000,000 volts the initial resistance of atmospheric air to electrical discharges becomes less, and the discharges, therefore, are shunted through the air instead of upon the wa-ter. Prof. Trowbridge thinks it doubtful, if the testimony of those who claim to have seen lightning strike the sea is to be accepted; they have mistaken the reflection of lightning in the water for the flash itself.—New Sork Sun.
