THE SAINT'S LIFE.
To local Irishmen, as well as to all
other Irishmen, the story of St. Patrick
is always new. History has not reveal-
ed the exact date of his birth, but he
was born in Scotland or Ireland, the
three countries to which are attributed his
birthplace, but the fact remains that
he was born in the north of Ireland,
and he lived the life of a saint in Ire-
land, and they, and those of their blood
in this country, are the only people
who celebrate his day, and who have
any memorials of him, the most noted
being the church that bears his name
in Dun-Patrick.

Men have come into the world, at-
tained distinction, and their memories
have been commemorated for some
centuries, but none of them have left
a more lasting impression than the
"Apostle of Ireland," the memory of
whose good works is renewed every
17th of March.
Many and widely conflicting are the
accounts which have been handed
down from century to century and from
father to son regarding St. Patrick.
He was born in Scotland at Dunbar-
ton, on the Clyde; at Nantes, France;
at Boulogne-sur-Mer, and at various
other places, according to many so-called
authorities, but his origin still re-
mains shrouded in mystery. Since in
his "Confessions" St. Patrick tells of
his flight to Ireland, it is not difficult to
infer that he was not already there.
However, Ireland, in his time, was
called Hibernia, or Scotia, and the peo-
ple Scots, which may account for the
apparent discrepancy.
All historians, however, appear to
agree in the main as to the story of
his life following his birth.

A SHEPHERD BOY.
He was only a shepherd boy when
he was filled with the desire to work
for the salvation of pagan Ireland, and
soon his fame spread all over the coun-
try, with the wonderful tales of his
conversions of the people.

Finally he came to the land of one
king, Leogaire by name, and there, on
the hill of Tara, of which Moore and
other Irish bards have sung, he incur-

INJURIES WERE FATAL

Former Resident of Glenora Struck
on Head by a Heavy Hammer.

Nathaniel F. Currie, of Detroit, son
of the late Nathaniel Currie, of Glen-
ora, who was at one time M. P. P. for
West Middlesex, met with a terrible
death at Detroit Saturday. Deceased
was employed as foreman with his
son, George E. Currie, a painter, pre-
sident contractor, and was working on
the new dock which is being erected for
the Parke, Davis firm. He was assist-
ing in erecting the sheet piling, and
was at the time of the accident kneel-
ing on a beam overhanging the water,

worked from lighters. Currie leaned

of his ear. The unfortunate man was
knocked unconscious in the instant.
Currie's injuries were of a terri-

tured, while concussion of the brain

morning. He leaves a wife and five
children.

The late Mr. Currie was 46 years of
age, and was born in Glenora. He is
survived by a wife and young family,

and sisters: George H., of Detroit;
Charles, of Glenora; Mr. W. G.
Lumley and Mrs. E. A. Middlemiss, of
Detroit.

STANDING STONES.
As a record of one of his greatest
deeds in his holy work is Stone Abbey,
or, rather, the ruins of it, standing on
Tara Hill, where St. Patrick is said to
have lived and where throughout
the country one may come upon an
ancient "standing stone," with the
cross which was engraved on it by or-
der of the saint, thus consecrating it
to Christian faith.
