SENSATIONAL SUICIDE

Royal Artillery Gunner Leaps Into the Water at Halifax.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 17.-A sensational suicide occurred at midnight, when a young gunner of the Royal Artillery, arrested for fighting on the street, broke from his captors, plunged into the icy water of the harbor, and was drowned. He had been arrested by the military police and was taken to the main guard room at the Queen's wharf. When the sergeant on duty was removing the prisoner's belt he broke away, dashed down the wharf, and with a wild shrick jumped into the water. Every effort was made to rescue the man, but he disappeared immediately. His name is unknown. He was about 23 years old. The authorities will hold an investigation.


