# DIETING JAPS TO MAKE THEM BIG; SOON TO BE OF CAUCASIAN SIZE

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 24. - That he will increase the size of the Japanese race to the normal stature of the Caucasian race, by teaching them how and what to eat, was the declaration made by Surgeon-General Takki, of Japan, in a lecture yesterday afternoon. The surgeon-general quoted statistics about the men of the army and navy to prove that by giving them a proper diet he has brought them nearer the standard of weight of the men of the English and American navies. Surgeon-General Takki declared that many diseases common in Japan have been almost wiped out by the same method. He has made it his life-work to find a method by which the size of the Japanese race can be made normal.

"Within a few generations I am sure that the Japanese race will be of normal size," he added. "It is one of the greatest humiliations of our life that we are so small. The Caucasian race is normal in size, and that is what we want to be. That is what we will be within a short time, if the people of my race follow my directions. The Emperor has promised to join hands and help the work along. Learned men must now agree that the Jasanese only need proper food and ple nty of it. ### **HING LAMED** FOR LIFE

New York, Feb. 24.-According to the London correspondent of the World, King Edward can never walk again without the aid of a cane. The King's fall while shooting in Windsor forest last November resulted in breaking a tendon achilles.

The King is 65 years old, and nature even with surgical assistance cannot completely repair the broken tendon achilles of a man of that age, the correspondent avers. Leaning on a stick, King Edward walks very slowly and with a pronounced limp. His Majesty leaned heavily on a crutchhandled, stout Malacca cane when he opened Parliament. He could not arise from the throne until the cane was handed to him. He wears an orthopaedic instrument inside his boot to support his ankle.

### MR. HYMAN'S SUGGESTION New Report on Niagara Falls by the Waterways Commission.

Ottawa, Feb. 24. - Before Canada French Premier Intimates that the adopts any policy with respect to the preservation of Niagara Falls the Minister of Public Works, Hon. C. S. Hyman, feels that the fullest official data should be obtained as to the extent to which the scenic beauty of the Falls may be impaired by the operations of the power development companies having authority to generate electrical energy. Accordingly he has made the suggestion that the international waterways commission should appoint experts to make surveys and compile the necessary information and pronounce authoritatively whether and to what extent the falls are being defaced or injured. Mr. Hyman's suggestion will be considered at a meeting of the commission to be held probably which will be the largest French ships in Toronto next week. If the idea is yet constructed. approved of and the information sought for is obtained both the Dominion and the United States Governments will be better able to reach a conclusion which will be fortified by the best engineering advice.
