The publishers are compelled by their agreement to give a discount of 20 per cent to purchasers in Toronto. to the trade, there is not unnaturally some discontent over the fact that the man who buys one book in Toronto from the publishers does so at identically the same rate as the bookseller whose order mounts up into the thousands of volumes, and who bears all the risks of safe.

The books themselves are very creditable. Neatly printed on good paper with a new, large type, they are a distinct improvement over the old readers. Today the first, second, third and fourth readers will be offered for sale. The primer, owing to the fact that the plates for it were not completed as soon as the others s still on the press, and will not be placed on sale for a week or more, but it is expected that they will be issued in plenty of time for the opening of the rural schools on the 16th of the month. One commendable feature of the new readers is their very moderate price. 


