MR. HAYS SAYS

(Continued From Page Eight.)

Can Ride the Storm.

"If we have plenty of money, we can ride out any storm, I find in a city like Ottawa a big demand for houses, merely from the large number of people brought in to build them. If this is not stopped suddenly, everything is affected. Canada today has far more consumers than producers. This is responsible for higher prices. Prices have gone up mostly on things produced in Canada. How are we to get back to normal conditions? If we are producing for world markets, you are safe, but if producing for home markets, you are not. Trusts are the flywheels on the lines of production. There is not a more beneficent organization in America today than the steel trust. Why can they steady everything over there, except their banks? Because they have 6,000 banks, and when there is a crisis they can get together and regulate things. In Canada, we have more of a bank trust. You cannot name a centime by having one or two of its legs, but you can a biped. It is organization and combination that steadies things. We are too often ready to hit a corporation without realizing that we are striking ourselves. There is an absolute necessity for us to study and understand our complex society conditions today. We should not always say, when we see a head, 'Hit it!' without stopping to think where it rests and what depends on it."

Mayor Beattie.

The toast to "The City of London" was responded to by Mayor Beattie. "The citizens of London have no idea," he said, "how much time or energy the council give in their service. We have been working late and early to keep down the tax rate. Londoners for some years have been hoping the G. T. R. would do away with that burden of antiquity across the way and give us a station commensurate with the importance of this city. We have given the G. T. R. liberal patronage, and have refrained entirely from discriminating, even after our differences with the Grand Trunk. I think the people of London deserve much credit for doing so. I trust Mr. Hays will not interpret this as a threat in any way, veiled or otherwise. It is but a natural consequence that this patronage may be transferred to those who are appreciating it the fullest. I hope we may have a union station when we do get one. It is said the G. T. R. have advantages here they will not willingly part with. When the Grand Trunk come to the conclusion to elevate the tracks, I am sure, we will deal fairly with them, and in a business-like way."

The Western University.

"A burning question here just now is that of the Western University. We were received in a way by Premier Whitney we did not anticipate. I have a great amount of sympathy for him. He does not realize that this is not a city of London affair. The cry for a university will come forward persistently from the people of this part of the Province. He must eventually listen to it."

"We have a request from the London and Port Stanley road for running street cars on Sunday. I am not an advocate of Sunday cars in any way."

but we should take steps to accord to our lessees this right, because, if one road has it, the other is entitled to it. The L. and P. S. R. is owned by the citizens of London and it should not be kept at a disadvantage."

"My reasons for voting against a publicly owned street car system were, we were beginning at the wrong end. We have \$500 in our estimates for advertising the city. We spent \$500 the year before. We should provide factory sites. If we wish to get factories, the sum of \$500 is not enough to secure a first-class man. I thought, as others thought, that an effort was being made to provide a berth for a gentleman who made himself very useful in certain ways at the last elections. I did not think this was the proper thing to do."

During the evening Mr. H. Ruthven McDonald, of Toronto, rendered a number of songs most acceptably. He was accompanied by Mr. Charles E. Wheeler. A fine programme of music was rendered by Tony Cortese's orchestra.

It is now said he is leaning toward the use of his name as a renomination.

It can be said that Mr. Taft has no disposition to shrink from the responsibilities of his administration and that he will not hesitate to stand for renomination if the party calls him. Republican leaders who have talked with him recently on this subject say his attitude is practically this: If at the end of his first term the Republican party feel like calling upon him again even if it is to go down to defeat, he will accept; and if it does not, he will retire with the satisfaction of knowing that he has done what he believed to be best.

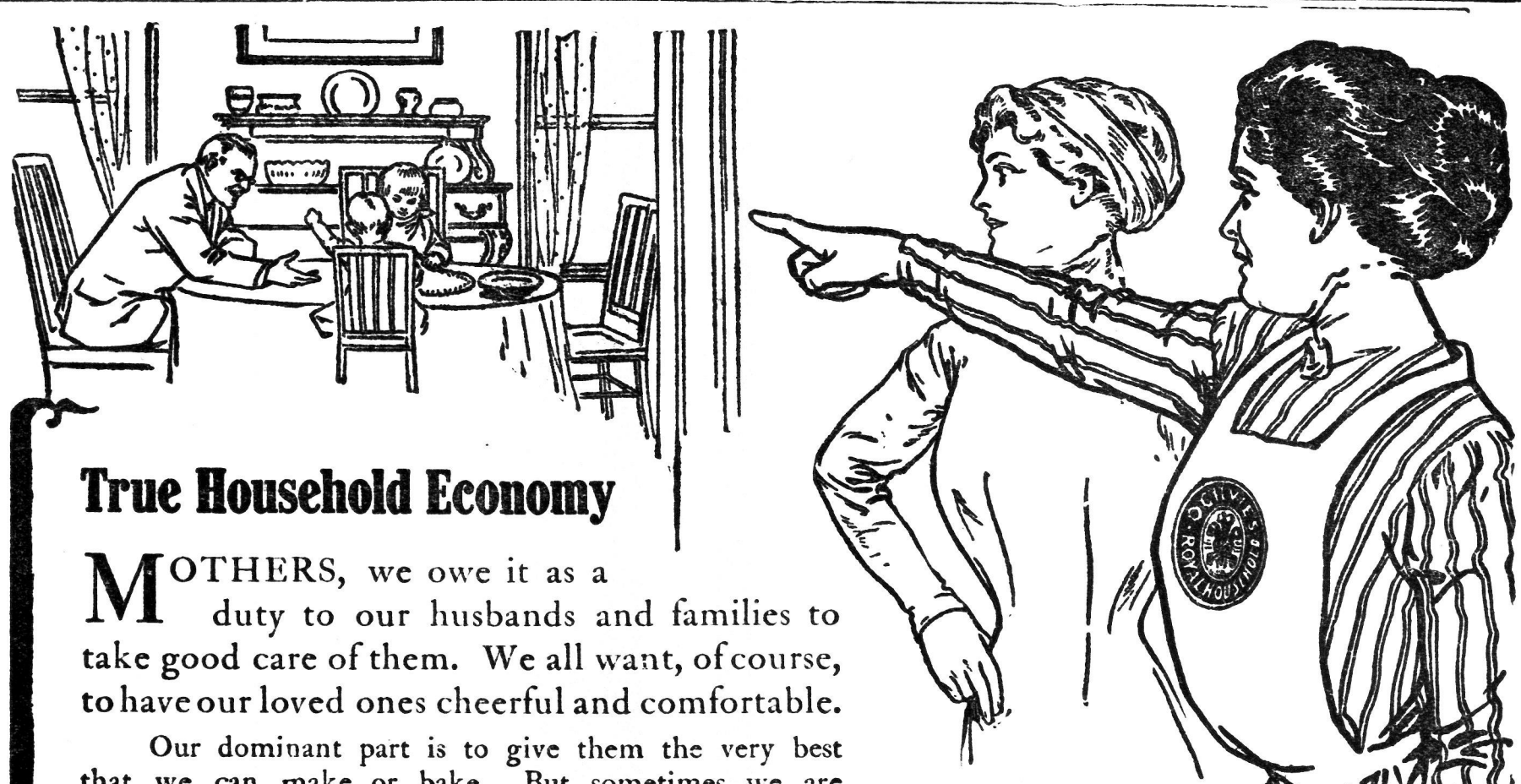
