Was Engine Driver on Great Western

Body of Mr. Richard Anderson Was Brought Here for Burial.

The Evanston, Illinois, Daily News of Sept. 15, refers to the death of Mr. Richard Anderson as follows:

Richard Anderson, father of Mrs. C. D. Macpherson, 1819 Ashland avenue, died in the home of the latter last night. He was 82 years old.

Death was caused by infirmities incident to old age. For several months he had been in a feeble condition.

Short funeral services were held at the Macpherson home this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The body was taken to London, Ont., for burial in the family lot besides the bodies of his wife, one son and one daughter, who died several years ago. Funeral services will be conducted in London, Ont., tomorrow afternoon.

Mr. Anderson had been a resident of Evanston for twenty years, living a retired life in the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. D. Macpherson. He was born in Scotland, Dec. 8, 1831. At the age of 21 years he came to the United States and settled in Detroit, Mich., where he was married a few years later. In 1855 he moved to London, Ont. For many years he was employed as a locomotive engineer on the Great Western Railway until that road was merged with the Grand Trunk system.

In 1893 Mr. Anderson came to London to make his home with his daughter. Since that time he has lived a quiet, retired life. Besides Mrs. Macpherson, he leaves three other daughters, Mrs. Richard Wilson, of this city; Mrs. J. H. Doyle, of Sarnia, Ont.; and Mrs. Charles Davies, of Cleveland, Ohio.

Mr. Anderson was one of the oldest members of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, having become a member of that order in 1857. He was also an old member of the Masonic Order, having joined that prominent organization in 1859.

PORTABLE SCHOOL IS PROPOSAL OF MR. DENNIS

Could Be Utilized To Relieve the Congestion at Various Schools of City.

Dennis, chairman of the board, believes that the only solution of the Empress avenue problem would be the erection of a portable school building, a wooden, temporary affair, at the rear of the present school. This would relieve the situation until such times as a nucleus to a new school for West London district could be started. It could then be taken down and removed to some other quarter, where a good accommodation was at a premium.

EXPRESS HIT TIES WHILE TRAVELLING FAST

Grand Trunk No. 14 Narrowly Escapes Being Derailed Near Stratford.

Grand Trunk Express No. 14, in charge of Conductor McAuliffe, this city, narrowly escaped derailment near Little Lake station, a local stop a few miles east of Stratford, Tuesday afternoon.

The train was travelling at a good rate of speed, after leaving Stratford, and shortly before arrival at Little Lake ran into a couple of ties that had been placed across the tracks.

But for the fact that the ties had been exposed in the open for some time and were partially decayed, a bad wreck would have occurred. As it was the heavy drive wheels of the engine ground them into powder, and no resistance sufficient to stop the train was offered.

The train was stopped on the other track would have been more effective, however, as the ties lying there were comparatively new.

A thorough investigation will be made into the affair.

COURT GIVES GRACE CHANGE TO REFORM

London Woman Remanded by a Toronto Police Magistrate.

Toronto, Sept. 17.—"Grace Langdon," called Officer Chapman, a round-faced young woman, head bare, had done low at the back of her neck, clad in a good gown of light raw silk, and somewhat dilapidated black silk coat, came forward in answer to the summons to court.

The face, with its fresh coloring, somehow could not be associated with any deep tragedy. Yet twice during the past two months Grace had tried to commit suicide. The latest attempt was made on Saturday, when she was found suffering from laudanum poisoning.

On Tuesday the charge was one of drunkenness, a further hint of some of the undercurrents in the young woman's life lay in Crown Attorney Corley's words:

"She has no home, your worship, no place to go."

But the prisoner's view did not seem to coincide with this.

"I'll go back home if I only get a chance," she repeated twice.

"Will you go with Miss Williams?" questioned Magistrate Ellis, ignoring her remark. A glance toward the corner where sat the gentle Scotch lady of the Bellamy Home, a quickly spoken "Yes," and the round-faced girl was on her way to the shelter.

That was after the magistrate had given the sentence, "Remanded till called for." On the bench of safety, Grace said some things.

"Yes, I think someone would give me money to go back home with. I came here to work, and know I was getting on all right, but I shouldn't have taken the laudanum. I was all right, but somebody tore my coat very badly last night."

When found on Saturday on John street, ill with effects of the laudanum, the young woman told a strange story. It was to the effect that in a lodging-house—situated she knew not where—she was forcibly given the drug by a woman for whom she had purchased it, after being overpowered by a man. Before returning to court on Tuesday morning she confessed to Inspector Kennedy that her story was false.

Said to Have No Home.

The woman said she had agreed to leave London two months ago when charged with vagrancy. She did so. But instead of going to Blenheim, which was supposed to be her destination—she had an uncle and aunt there—she started for the United States, was stopped at Detroit by immigration officers, and while being escorted back to Chatham, attempted to jump into the Detroit River. After the arrest at Chatham she was sent back to London, but came to Toronto last week.

Ontario Passes Films Barred by Others

Condemned in Most Places Toronto Sees the Thaw Pictures.

Toronto, Sept. 17.—Ontario stands in a somewhat lonely position in allowing the pictures of Harry K. Thaw and his visit to Canada to appear in its theatres. The board of censors for moving pictures in this Province has passed the film and it was shown at a local picture theatre Monday morning, afternoon and evening.

Alberta censors refused to pass the pictures. The Winnipeg censors afterwards placed a ban on them.

Many large American cities have set down the law that the fugitive from Matteawan shall not appear on the screens within their boundaries.

The film depicting Thaw at Sherbrooke and Coaticook is a very short one and hardly shows Thaw plainly at all. He is caught in flashes while passing through crowds with a police officer and just as he enters an automobile.

"There is absolutely nothing objectionable in the two films that we passed of Thaw," said Chairman G. E. Armstrong. "The first one we allowed to go was about a thousand feet film and the other was about 250 feet. They show simply Thaw's movements in Quebec."

"We condemned one picture of Thaw which was taken," he continued. "It showed the whole Thaw case from the beginning of his escape to Canada. The only reason for objection to the other films is that they are identified with the name of Thaw, and that is not sufficient to condemn them. These pictures do not give

nearly as much publicity to the Thaw affairs as the newspapers have done."
