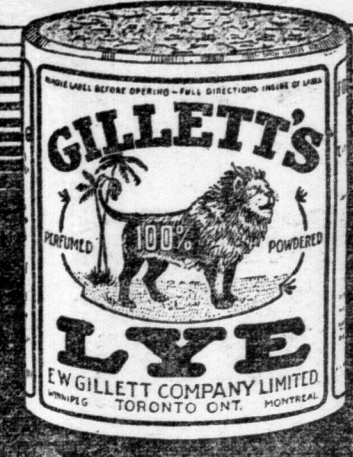


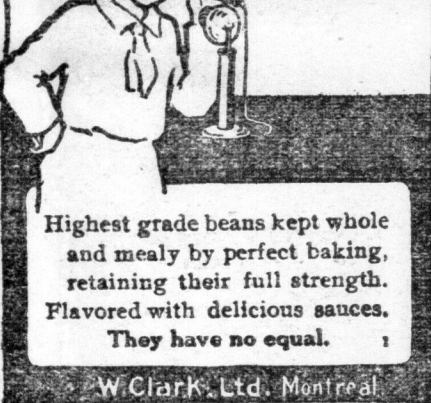

MEXICANS HAVE THE
SECURING OF PEACE
IN OWN HANDS NOW

To Warring Factions Is Left
the Choice of Suitable
President.

MEDIATORS STAND ASIDE

Protocols Signed and All In-
terest Is Fixed on Man To
Be Named.

Niagara Falls, Ont., June 25.—Peace between the United States and Mexico rests today on a single condition—the establishment of a new provisional government along lines which will justify the world in according it recognition. Mexican factions have given guaranty that they will exert every effort to accomplish this.

Five weeks of incessant labor by the mediators resulted in the completion last night of protocols, agreeing that the diplomatic relations between the United States and Mexico shall be restored, and all other international difficulties considered settled, when a new provisional government succeeds the Huerta administration.

Mexicans To Decide.

Upon the representatives of the two warring factions in Mexico devolves the task of selecting a provisional president and his cabinet, to serve in the interim, while the country is being pacified and made ready for a general presidential election.

Mediation does not adjourn. The diplomats and the American delegates will lend their counsel and advice, wherever possible, to the delegates of the two factions, as they meet in informal conferences. The meeting place has not been decided, but as Niagara Falls, Ont., is neutral soil, and the Huerta delegation, mediators and American delegates are comfortably fixed here, this is most likely to be continued as the place of conference.

Definite assurance that the meeting will be held has been given the mediators by Constitutional representatives in Washington and the Huerta delegates.

United States Forces To Go.

The incentive to the participants in the informal conference for a quick agreement is that the United States stands ready to withdraw her forces from Mexico soil after an agreement is reached. The mediation conference has discreetly left to the Mexican factions the work of settling the internal problem of their country. There has been no loss of dignity, no humbling of sovereignty. The two factions will be put to the supreme test of patriotism. Upon the results of their task, the world will pass judgment, and they have been given an opportunity to demonstrate that Mexico is capable of settling her own affairs.

The situation was brought to its present status only after mediation many times had seemed ready to collapse. The exclusion of Constitutionalists from a voice in proceedings not only had alienated their interest, but the American Government firmly announced that it would be useless to make any agreement on the internal problem of Mexico—its pro- or anti-constitutionalism—until the Constitutionalists approved. Late last night the signatures of the two sets of delegates and the mediating plenipotentiaries were affixed to the protocols. In effect, they provide:

The Provisions.

First, that a provisional government shall be set up on a certain date, which shall be recognized by the nationals of Mexico.

Second, the provisional government shall be constituted by agreement of delegates representing the parties to Mexico's internal struggle.

Third, diplomatic relations between the United States and Mexico shall be resumed and recognition accorded the new provisional government.

Fourth, no war indemnity shall be paid to the United States, or "other interna-

tional satisfaction claimed." Absolute amnesty to foreigners for any and all political offences shall be proclaimed.

Fifth, Argentina, Brazil and Chile agree to recognize the new provisional government.

The mediators and delegates were happy today. They felt that a long stride toward internal peace in Mexico had been taken through from practical settlement of the international differences.

Twenty Aeroplanes
Guard of Honor at
Austrian Burial

VIENNA, June 24.—An escort of twenty aeroplanes, flying mourning flags and manned by aviators from several nations, formed a flying guard of honor at the burial today of the nine Austrian officers and men killed in the tragic air catastrophe a few miles from Vienna on Saturday. The presence of this aerial fleet created a vivid impression.

An enormous concourse of people, including several archdukes, members of the Austrian cabinet and foreign military attaches, was present at the graveside to testify the general sorrow felt for the aviators, who had died doing their duty during the army manoeuvres.

While the funeral service was in progress, the small air craft circled round and round the cemetery, and then flew off in company.

SWIMMER DROWNED
IN SIGHT OF FRIENDS

W. Willis, Former St. Thomas
Man, Seized With Cramps
—Body Recovered.

PORT ALMA, June 24. Evidently seized with cramp, as he was enjoying a swim after his day's work, Walter Willis, a young Englishman, sank in the lake this evening, and drowned in sight of several people fishing off the dock.

Mr. Willis was employed by the Glenwood Natural Gas Company, and about eight o'clock decided to seek relief from the heat in a swim. He went in alone, and after a few minutes swimming round, was seen to sink. One of the men fishing off the dock, none of whom could swim, threw a life-preserver to him, but he never came up.

The authorities were notified, and after a search, lasting over an hour, the body was recovered.

So far as has been learned, Willis had no relatives in Canada. His home address was 27 Union road, Leytonstone, London, England, and a relative, E. C. Willis, still lives there. Prior to coming here, the unfortunate young man was with the M. C. R. at St. Thomas, his address there being 12 John street.

It has been decided that an inquest is unnecessary, as it was evidently a case of accidental drowning.

Walter Willis was a popular fellow, aged about 24, and his sudden death is a distinct loss to the Port.

TEAM KNOCKED DOWN;
DRIVERS ARE UNHURT

Lightning Strikes Between
Trees Where Hearse Stood
—House Set on Fire.

BELMONT, June 24.—During a terrific electrical storm here early this afternoon Undertaker W. Hunt and his driver, R. Copeman, had a remarkable escape from being killed by lightning.

They were on their way to the funeral of John McKellar, who was found dead in bed on Monday, and seeing the storm coming up, drove the hearse and team in between two large trees to escape the shower.

There was a vivid display of lightning, and within three minutes bolts struck both trees beside the hearse. Both horses were thrown to the ground and considerably shocked, and Mr. Hunt and his driver were slightly shocked. Both, while badly frightened, escaped serious injury. They were able to get the horses up again, after some minutes, and as soon as possible proceeded on their way to the funeral.

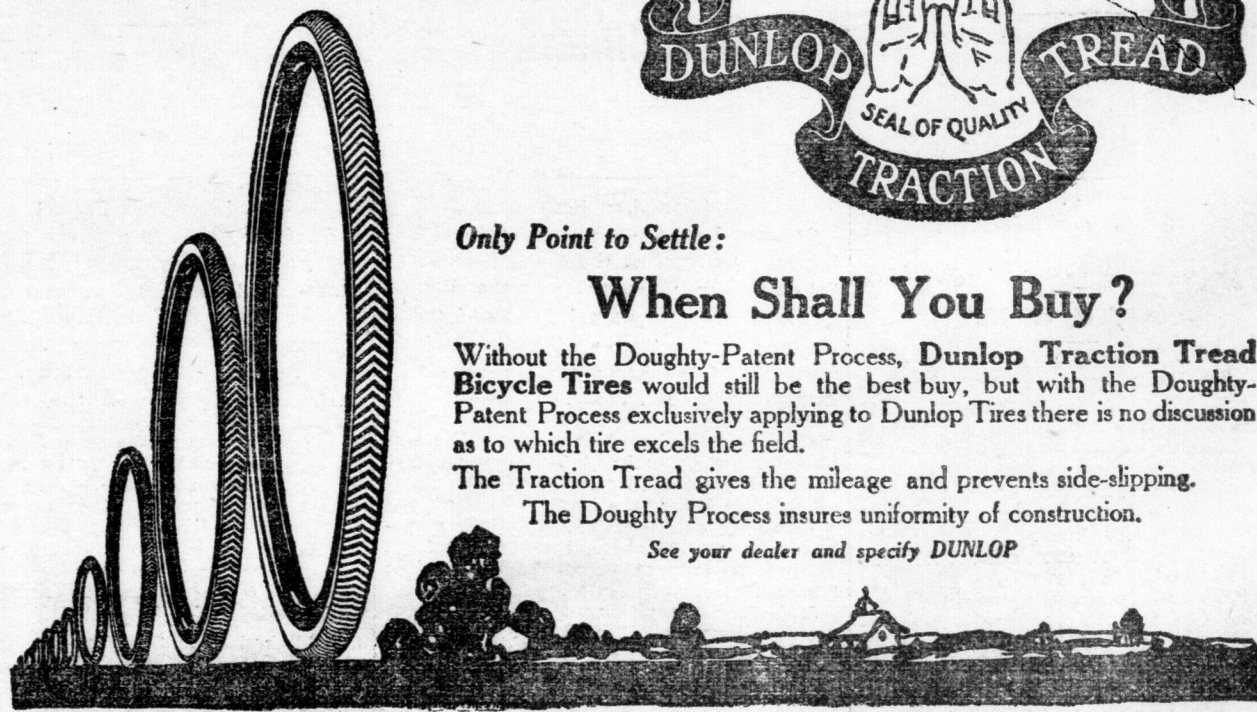
