

WILL COMPEL TURKS TO LIVE UP TO TERMS

Allied Governments Authorize
Commissioners to Take
Necessary Steps.

MAY DECLARE SIEGE Governor of Constantinople States Orders Came From Angora.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—The allied commissioners in Constantinople have been given full authority to declare a state of siege or take any other measures to preserve order. This was the response of the allied governments to the cable requests of the high commissioners for permission to take complete and speedy action. It is now certain that the allied authorities here will deal with any attempts at disturbance or infringement of the Mudania convention in a drastic manner. British, French and Italian are as one in their determination to check the powerful movement which the Kemalists have set in motion. The British have been the most active in the intentions of the Turkish Nationalists were made evident related to the least degree their vigilance, and French warships about to proceed here, or are on their way to strengthen the allied authority. Lieutenant-General Harrington, commander-in-chief of the British forces, has informed Rafet Pasha, the new governor, that he would permit no usurpation of the allied authority. The British have been very active in their attempts to take over the customs revenues, but the British authorities have decided to operate the customs themselves. The calling of three additional classes to the Turkish colors is interpreted here as merely a show of force.

REFUSE TURKISH DEMANDS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—Allied general meeting with Rafet Pasha stood firmly against Turkish demands. General Harrington coldly informed the Kemal leader that he has not power to accept the provisions of the Mudania pact. He pointed out that Constantinople is shortly to be taken over by the Turkish Nationalists anyway, and that the allied authorities have no intention of allowing the Kemalists to usurp Allied authority. Turkish Nationalists signed the Mudania agreement, signed by the Allies at Mudania, by attempting to enforce the tariff laws at Constantinople. Last night they closed the customs house preparatory to making the proposed new schedules effective today.

A storm of protest from citizens of Allied countries doing business in Constantinople was aroused by this move. The Mudania agreement guaranteed maintenance of the status quo as far as rates and duties were concerned until peace was signed. Enforcement of the Kemalists' tariff amendments to virtual Allied recognition of the National pact, which is but a step towards the extension of the Nationalist regime here, is regarded as critical, and Allied troops are constantly on the alert to suppress the first sign of an outbreak.

CONSTANTINOPLE ALARMED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7.—Constantinople is in a fever of apprehension over the Kemalists' demands for the evacuation of the allied military and naval forces, and the extension of the Nationalist regime here. The allied high commissioners have been informed that the Nationalist governor here, 48 hours in the morning, and condemned to death. All Kemal Bey, editor of the anti-Nationalist sabbah.

An unconfirmed report today had it that all Kemal already had been executed at Istanbul. Meanwhile the allied commissioners have asked their governments for instructions with a view to the proclamation of martial law. They held an extraordinary council last night at which the recent series of threatening demands by the Nationalists were discussed at length, and the adoption of a firmer attitude was decided upon in resistance to the Kemalists' arbitrary demands for the curbing of their activities in Constantinople, Eastern Thrace and other areas, and counteracting the increasing inroads of the Mudania convention. It is understood the commissioners even considered the expulsion of Rafet Pasha from the capital in the event of the Nationalist armistice violations. The commissioners held a conference with Hamid Bey, and informed him that the allied governments, while not desiring to interfere with Turkish national affairs, must maintain the strictest control which the allies regarded as necessary during the occupation of Constantinople.

Meanwhile the city, which had been languidly anticipating the Lausanne conference to clear up the various disputes, became the prey to worse fears than that which prevailed before the Mudania peace was signed, in the belief that the Kemalists intended to destroy their own demands. It was remarked, however, that for the first time in many weeks there has been complete unanimity reached among the British, French
