Buchanan Expects To Show at Least \$10,000 on Right Side of Ledger.

The waterworks department of th public utilities commission will promise an estimated surplus of \$10, 900 for 1923 when estimates for the coming year are presented at the meeting of the city council on Mon-

Mr. Buchanan stated today that the commission is confident that the department will be able to show this surplus after all provisions have been made for debenture issues, inprovisions have cluding the cost of new meters which the department desires to in-stall during the year.

#### Prospects Bright,

The prospects for the year, according to this report, promise as great a success as attended the efforts of the department during the prosperous year of 1922, when a similar amount was turned back to the ratepayers.

The ten thousand dollars will go towards the reduction of the general tax rate of the city.

The city parks will be maintained this year at a lower tax rate than during the past year, when a record for the Dominion was established. This, also, will be borne out by estimates that are to go before the city council from the public utilities on Monday.

The commission will ask \$34,000 he same amount as last year, for the upkeep of the several parks. With the assessment of the city considerably increased, this will mean that the city will pay a lower rate.
