IMPROVED CONDITIONS IN THEATRE BUSINESS

Better Showing Made By Toronto Company In 1922 -Outlook Bright.

Toronto, April 16 .- Improving conditions in the theatrical field in Canada during 1922 and continued into 1923 are Marcus Loew's Theatres, Limited, Toronto, for the 12-month period ending January 6 last. This company operates two theatres in Toronto, the Uptown and Loew's Yonge Street Theatre, and during the year was able to show many steadily improving earnings; to reduce worth bank loans by nearly \$130,000; provide

bank loans by nearly \$130,000; provide \$23,136 for 1922 and 1923 taxes, and likewise meet 1920 and 1921 taxes amounting to \$18,118. Furthermore, the operating deficit of the previous year has been substantially reduced.

Operating revenue, less expenses, from the Yonge Street Theatre totaled \$172,618 and from the Bloor Street Theatre \$53,694, an aggregate of \$226,312. After interest, general expenses and an allowance of \$56,499 for depreciation, the profit for the year is carried at \$25,181. To this is added the deficit of \$13,278 carried forward from the previous year, and after income taxes there is a deficit amounting to \$6,192.

\$6.192. The balance sheet shows assets totaling \$2.308.164. Real estate leaseholds, etc., are valued at \$1,484.686. Current assets total \$10,581. Current account overdraft has been reduced to \$73.785. Bonded indebtedness has been reduced to \$519,053. Accounts payable and accrued charges are lower at \$14,514. The report on the whole indicates that a very marked degree of recovery has been effected in 1922, and prospects point to a much better showing in 1923. Weekly earnings are said to be much better, and it is understood that directors have been able to pay off the balance of the bank loan. The annual meeting will be held on April 24 next.


