Now that you have looked, you will want to look again when you realize that the pose sketched is the perfect picture of the top of the stroke for the full St. Andrew's swing with the driver. There is nothing wrong with the man in the picture at all. If you could swing a club with such form as that you would see your ball go some 250 yards down the fairway.

from every tee. Note the position of the arms and of the shoulder. Note how the left shoulder has dipped. The weight is entirely on the right leg in this full swing with the body perfectly poised. The left shoulder is turned away from the ball so that the player is in position to put the whole force of his swing and his power on to the ball. Clip this picture out today and use it as a guide tomorrow. I will tell you tomorrow whether it would be advisable for you to try to use this swing.

RECORD ENTRY MARKS CANADIAN GOLF OPEN

Sarazen and Jock Hutchinson Among Invading U.S. Golfers.

Canadian Press Despatch, Toronto, Aug. 2.—When the last pair tee off shortly after noon tomorrow for the first four rounds that comprise the Canadian open golf championship at the Lakeview course a new record will be established for this, the premier event in Canadian golf. The entry list is larger than ever before. Tonight the total number of entries is 126, one more than the previous record of 125 at the Toronto Club in 1921. More players arrived in the city this afternoon and evening, and it is expected that the list will reach 150.

Not only in quantity have the entrants in the open championship set a new mark, but in quality also. Three countries are represented. Capt. A. Bullock Webster of Summerville, England, is the only foreigner in the field. The United States is represented by 125 players, including 29 professionals of well-known ability, led by the ex-national champion, Gene Sarazen, and Jock Hutchinson of Chicago, an open champion in 1921.

This year's championship will be the sixtieth Canadian open, and the Canadian players are determined that the series of American victories which have resulted since the resumption of the event in 1919, after a four-year lapse on account of the war, shall be broken. Lavalle himself holds the title of South American amateur middleweight champion. At the cable request of Firpo, he is taking with him Argentine-made boxing gloves of fourteen ounces weight to use in softening the challenger's blows on his sparring partners.
