## GO TO CANADA IS

### WANAMAKER'S ADVICE

Dominion the Country of the Future is View of Famous Merchant and He Points Way Here to Youth Across Border.

John Wanamaker returned home yesterday aboard the steamship Oceanic after a three months' tour in Europe. He attended the coronation ceremonies as the guest of T. Vezev Strong, Lord Mayor of London, who presented him to King George V. The king then presented Mr. Wanamaker to Queen Mary.

Both their majesties are delightful personages, Mr. Wanamaker said yesterday. He was struck with the king's virility, strength and splendid common sense.

Queen Mary, added Mr. Wanamaker, is a superior woman, who impresses you with her womanhood and her splendid poise and capacity to act a helpmeet to the King.

Mr. Wanamaker said he was much gratified at President Taft's attitude in the peace movement and the sincerity of his intention to continue the advocacy of universal peace until it is considered by other nations.

The Lord Mayor engineered the great Guildhall meeting, at which Premier Asquith, Lord Balfour, the Archbishop of Canterbury and others took such a decided stand in favor of arbitration.

Regarding reciprocity, Mr. Wanamaker said the English people seemed to favor the idea in the abstract, but that they had many differences of opinion as to the articles of agreement. Mr. Wanamaker held a pamphlet on Canada in his hand, and pointing to it, said:  
"Canada is a great country. It is a fine field for Americans. There is no longer any need for our young men to go west. They should go north and settle in the country of the future."

## JOHN McNEISH

Dalhousie, July 15—John McNeish of Point LaNim, Restigouche county, died at the Campbellton hospital on Thursday at the age of 84. He was one of the pioneers of the parish of Dalhousie, which he represented for several years at the county council. Besides his wife and two children, Mrs. James C. Miller, of Summerside, Restigouche county, and Angus at home, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. John Caldwell, residing in the United States; two brothers, William and Alexander of Point LaNim, and leaves a large circle of relatives and friends. His funeral took place today and interment was in St. John's Presbyterian cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. J. H. Thirk, assisted by Rev. B. J. Coleman. The pallbearers were Daniel McDonald, John Nowlan, Wm. Miller, Alex. McDonald, George Miller and Alex. Cook.

## TRIBUTE TO CANADA PAID BY PAPER IN WESTERN STATES

The Change That Has Been Wrought in Recent Years Calls For Admiration of Neighbors to The South.

Spokane, Wash., July 17—Under the heading, "Canada Has Thrown Aside Her Swaddling Clothes," the Spokesman Review publishes a lengthy editorial, saying in part:

The Transformation of Canada from a colony to a nation is one of the most interesting and significant facts of modern political history. A decade or two ago Canada's position was anything but pleasant. Her climate had frightened Europeans away. Our Lady of the Snows, as Kipling called her, was regarded as a land dominated by barren winter.

Today this impression no longer misleads the average man, and the hundreds of thousands of emigrants from England and Europe that have settled in Canada during the last ten years have enabled the Canadians to develop the country to such an extent that her products and resources have become famous the world over.

Changed and better conditions in Canada have brought about a marked difference in the Canadian attitude toward the rest of the world. A decade ago Canada moved with the hesitating steps of an infant among the nations of the world. Today she has thrown aside her swaddling clothes and taken her place among the nations of the earth.

Although a color under the British crown, she enjoys a complete autonomy and is free to enter into treaties with other nations in regard to her material welfare. Consequent upon this greater freedom and enlarged horizon the Canadian has become imbued with a spirit of absolute confidence and determined optimism with regard to the country's future.
