Artificial Flowers. The exportation of artificial flowers from France declined in value from over \$4,700,000 to about \$3,600,000 in 1882, or a loss of about 24 per cent. This diminution was the greatest in the case of exports to any particular country, such as Germany and the United States. The former took in 1881, and America took nearly \$400,000 less than two years ago.
