THE DOMINION NOT ASKED TO AP-PROVE THE PLAN.

Imperial Penny Postage Opposed by the British Government, and the More Important Colonies Have Not Been Approached on the Matter—The French Shore Question and Newfoundland.

London, March 15.—In the House of Commons to-day Right Hon. Arnold Morley, the Postmaster-General, informed Mr. Henniker Heaton, M.P., that the Government had taken no steps to obtain the assent of the Canadian and of the Anatonian Government to the obtain the assent of the Canadian and of the Australian Governments to the Imperial penny postage scheme. The Government, Mr. Morley continued, was well aware that many of the important colonies were opposed to the scheme. Mr./Henniker Heaton denies this statement, and says that Canada and the Australasian Colonies would welcome the immediate institution of a penny rate from England, as a first step, if only properly approached.

The Prince of Wales and Lord Rosebery warmly supported Mr. Heaton's plans,
