We take this opportunity to congratulate Your Lordship and Family on Your safe and pleasing return to the Government of a Country so much endebted to Your Lordship's Councils, for the free and happy Constitution it now enjoys: A Constitution assuring above all others yet imagined, the Prosperity and Happiness of Mankind.

Sensibly affected at seeing the Son of their Sovereign, discovering in the Service which He has embraced, talents worthy of the Illustrious Blood which flows in his Veins; and manifesting the greatest desire of putting them in practice with more effect against the attacks of the Common Enemy; they consider it their duty and owe it to Justice to pay tribute to such distinguished merit, by a public declaration of their sentiments of Respect and admiration.
