Chiniquy was born in the town of Kamarouska, Canada, studied at the States and Canada. seminary of Quener and was ordained priest in 1833. He distinguished himself by his talents, as also by his great zeal as a tectotaler. His successes and the consequent honors elated him and organized in Chicago. caused his fall. He became careless in his duties and soon fell into sins of imwas charged that Chiniquy had been intimate with a woman. September 28, 1851 he was suspenped and deposed. He t en left Canada, and for several years loomed up at various places in Il-linois, until the Bishop of Chicago, having learned who Chimquy was, suspended and deposed him again, November, 20, 1856. Subsequently Chiniquy travelled to Europe to collect money for a pretended seminary in Chicago and his thirty promising pupils. In 1862 his fraud was discovered, that he had neither seminary nor pupils; he was accused of fraud and gross swindling and rejecten or expelled by

the Protestant synod of Chicago. * *

* For a few years the Presbyterians managed to get along with him; but soon he was accused of having squandered great sums of money entrusted to his care. He was consequently rejected by the Presbyterians, and wandered about, giving vent to his anger against the Catholic church that had expelled

him for his immorality."

Mr. Ewart Leaves for England to Argue the Mauitoba Case - A. Victory for the Sisters in the United States.

Mr. John S. Ewart, Q. C., left Monlao en route to England to appear before the privy council in the appeal brought by the Catholics in the Manitoba school case. Mr. Ewart will be associated with Mr. Holden, Q. C., of Loudon, both these gentlemen appearing for the appellants. It is expected that the case will come up in about a fortnight. The most important feature of the case is the amouncement that the provincial government will be rep-resented by counsel. Mr. Cozen-Hardy, Q.C., a well-known English barrister, having been retained to appear and argue the case for the government. It will be remembered that when this appeal came before the supreme court at Ottawa the government declined to

The U.S. Supreme Court has handed down an opinion confirming the decision of the lower court in the disputed case of the Roman Catholic Sisters teaching in the common schools. The decision reads: Inasmach as no proof has been submitted that religious sectarian instruction is imparted by the sisters luring school hours, and because of the fact that the women are Catiolics does not disqualify them under the constitution, and quotes from an article of the bill of rights, which extends to all men the right to worship God according to the dictates of their conscience. The opinion furtier declares that the selection of Catholic teachers by the school board is not a violation of law and says the fact that these teachers contributed. fact that these teachers contributed their earnings for religious purposes has no bearing on the matter.
