hon. friend from Calgary (Mr. M. S. Mc-Carthy) is amply justified in reminding him that the men from the new provinces who fought in South Africa are entitled to grants of land for their services, and I trust that he will see his way clear, in view of the fact that this government retains control of the lands, to give scrip to every man who fought in South Africa.

Explorations and surveys, printing and publishing reports, maps, &c., wages of assistant explorers, draughtsmen, clerks and others, purchase of specimens, books, instruments, stationery, mapping materials, maintenance of museum, laboratory apparatus, chemicals, miscellaneous expenses, &c., advances to 4xplorers, \$60,000.

Mr. OLIVER. During the season of 1904, there were twenty-five parties in the field, and it is proposed to send out twenty-five exploratory parties in 1905.

Mr. R. L. BORDEN. Are there any special results, the hon. minister desires to mention ?

Mr. OLIVER. They are the ordinary explorations. Immediate results are not looked for from the explorations of the Geological Survey. They lay the basis for future explorations and examination. The report of last year is now being bound and will be published in a short time.

Mr. W. F. MACLEAN. Does the hon. minister know how much the United States are spending annually on the same survey ?

Mr. OLIVER. They are spending a million and a half dollars on geological exploration.

Mr. W. F. MACLEAN. And increasing it every year.

Mr. SAM. HUGHES. Has there been a geological exploration of the region now opened up in north Ontario where cobalt deposits are supposed to be so profuse?

Mr. OLIVER. That country has been under geological exploration many years, the work having been begun under the supervision of the late Sir William Logan. Parties were working from time to time, from that time forward. Last year a party was at work in the Temagami and Temiscaming districts.

For special explorations and surveys in British Columbia and the Yukon, and the publication of reports and maps thereon, \$19,000.

Mr. OLIVER. \$18,516 of the appropriation of \$19,000 voted in 1904-5 for geological work in the Yukon and British Columbia has been expended as follows:

R. W. Brock, assisted by Messrs. Young, Boyd and Denny in a detained examination of the Rossland mining district, together with reconnaissance work in the Lardeau district. Gold and copper.

Dr. H. S. Poole, an examination of the Nanaimo and Comox coal field and other geological work on Vancouver Island. (No assistance).

Dr. R. W. Ellis, Nicola coal field and Queen Charlotte Island. Coal, copper, iron assisted by Sydney Ells.

D. B. Dowling, Cascade Valley, Kananaskis and Elk river regions. Coal. (Assisted by George Malloch).
