

The Honourable Senator White, from the Standing Committee on Internal Economy and Contingent Accounts, presented their sixth Report.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

The Standing Committee on Internal Economy and Contingent Accounts beg leave to make their sixth Report as follows:—

The Committee recommend:—

1. That the appointment of Messrs. Thomas Green and Georges Langlois to the reporting staff of the Senate be continued for the present Session of Parliament upon the terms and conditions set forth in the Report of the Committee on Debates and Reporting of June 3, 1913, and in accordance with the further recommendation adopted by the Senate on the 30th June, 1938.

2. That the services of Mr. Thomas Green and Mr. Georges Langlois, be continued during the forthcoming recess of Parliament; and that Mr. Green be paid at the rate of \$25 per week and Mr. Langlois at the rate of \$10 per week.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Ordered, That the Standing Committee on Finance be authorized to examine and consider certain Bills based on the Budget Resolutions in advance of the said Bills reaching the Senate.

The Honourable Senator Dupuis called the attention of the Senate to the desirability of establishing a national organization in co-operation with all the Provincial Governments, whose functions would be to help mothers, to develop infant health and to reduce to its minimum infantile mortality.

After debate, it was—

Ordered, That further debate be adjourned until to-morrow.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Senate resumed the adjourned debate on the inquiry of the Honourable Senator McRae calling the attention of the Senate to the development of our Gold resources, and what an active programme to increase our Gold production could mean to the general prosperity of Canada, particularly in the employment of labour, the establishment of new communities and the importance of Gold in taking care of our foreign obligations.
