3rd Canadian (Toronto) regiment in support. The left was held by the 4th Canadian (Edmonton) regiment.

From 3 o'clock until 6 in the evening the Ontario regiment waited the command to charge, and sang their chosen songs, all popular. The enemy bombarded our position heavily with their artillery.

him a party of newspaper men from Montreal and Quebec, who were free of the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, by the Western Press.
