

lemn Ways, and in such as the Law  
 thought sufficient, had given Satisfac-  
 tion, of their being in the Interest of  
 the Protestant Succession : And if a-  
 ny were in that Interest, after such  
 Assurances given, the Mischief of their  
 abominable Perjury was their own ;  
 neither were the publick Affairs in-  
 jured, or the Succession weakened  
 thereby : *They say*, if it had been o-  
 therwise ; yet that they did all that  
 the Law required them to do ; and  
 they affirm, that several of the same  
 Kind of *Jacobites*, as they are now  
 called, were often, and all along, em-  
 ployed by the Ministry *before them*, and  
 without any Danger to the Protestant  
 Succession.

*They farther say*, That, as to *Jaco-*  
*bites*, let whosoever their Enemies  
 please be called so ; yet it does evi-  
 dently appear, in the whole Course  
 of their Administration, that what  
 Use soever they might make of *them*,  
 that yet, as *Jacobites*, they never did  
 any thing for them ; and their worst  
 Enemies cannot bring any Proof, that  
 they entred into any Measures for  
 the Setting the Pretender on the  
 K Throne ;
