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lemn Ways, and in such as the Law thought sufficient, had given Satisfaction, of their being in the Interest of the Protestant Succession: And if any were in that Interest, after such Assurances given, the Mischief of their abominable Perjury was their own; neither were the publick Assairs injured, or the Succession weakened thereby: They say, if it had been otherwise; yet that they did all that the Law required them to do; and they affirm, that several of the same Kind of facobites, as they are now called, were often, and all along, employed by the Ministry before them, and without any Danger to the Protestant Succession.

They farther say, That, as to Jacobites, let whosoever their Enemies please be called so; yet it does evidently appear, in the whole Course of their Administration, that what Use soever they might make of them, that yet, as Jacobites, they never did any thing for them; and their worst Enemies cannot bring any Proof, that they entred into any Measures for the Setting the Pretender on the Throne;
