CLEVELLAND, Aug. 16.—Another record was smashed at the North Randall Grand Circuit races to-day. The three miles of the free-for-all championship pace, with such speeders as Independence Boy, Earl, Jr., The Eel and Evelyn W., contending, were paced respectively in 2014, 2024 and 2084, a world's record for pacing three heats in a race. The first heat, paced in 2014, in addition to being the speediest mile ever paced on the North Randall track, stands as the fastest paced mile of the year. 
THE POPE'S CONDITION
