Railway communication has been restored, but the telegraph lines have not yet been repaired. In the absence of delayed reports it is still impossible to state the full damage done by the hurricane and tidal wave.

Advices received here today are to the effect that there has been considerable looting at Savanna la Mar and Montego Bay. An armed constabulary has been sent to both places.

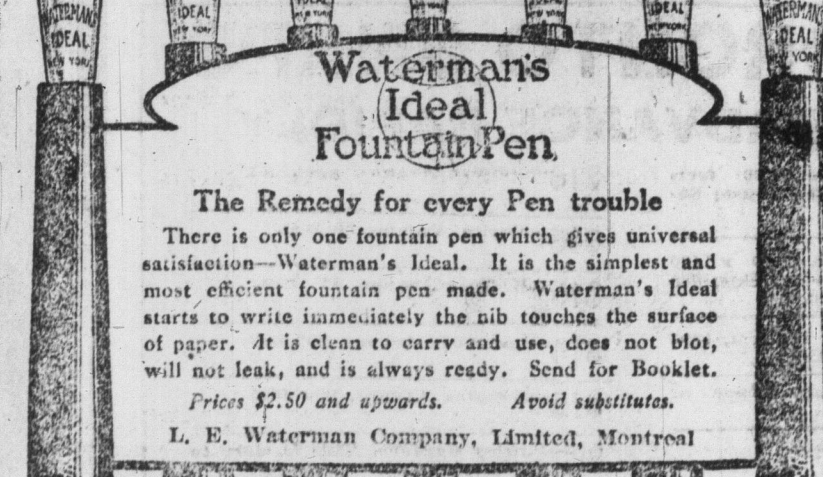
