

The telegram conveyed no other information. Sergt. Arkell, aged 20, was born in England and had lived in Canada 12 years. He enlisted in the 77th (Ottawa) Battalion in July, 1915, and left for overseas service in June. 1916. He was severely wounded at battle of the Somme on Oct. 21, 1916. and after his recovery was transferred to the 23rd Reserve, Bramshott Camp, from which place he went to Aldershot, where he successfully ferred to Bramshott.
Sergt. Arkell was one of the finest
