BRITAIN AND RUSSIA MAKE A DEAL TO PROTECT PERSIA

Present Negotiations Expected to Settle All the Differences Between Powers.

London, March 10.—The internal affairs of Persia, which, according to official information, are far from satisfactory, are being closely watched by the officials of the foreign office.

Great Britain and Russia have already agreed on the steps to be taken by them. Great Britain anticipates that, should the condition of the country reach a critical stage, the shah, who frequently called on Russia, before he ascended the throne for financial assistance and sought the advice of the representatives of that country in other emergencies, will ask for Russia's help to restore order.

The Russian government could comply with the request with the full knowledge that no obligation would be made by Great Britain. Russia may even offer assistance without the invitation of the shah, or offer which Great Britain would advise the Persian ruler to accept.

Great Britain would do her part in sending warships to the Persian coast, but she would not go further unless the landing of a force became necessary to protect foreigners in Persia, which by agreement would be recognized as Great Britain's sphere of influence.

This condition is a result of negotiations that have been going on for twelve months for the settlement of all outstanding differences between the two powers, which continue to progress satisfactorily, and which shortly may be brought to a successful close.

This better understanding between Russia and Great Britain has made smoother the negotiations between Russia and Japan.

ST. JOHN, N.B., March 10.—(Special.)—The withdrawal of two Donaldson Line sailings for March, owing to the freight blockade in the west, and the withdrawal of the Allan turbine steamships from St. John on account of the lack of cargo, will have a material effect on the season's business.

To date there have been filed at the custom-house cargoes for seventy-four steamships, as follows: C. P. R., 27; Allan, 14; Donaldson, 14; Man-chester, 8; Head, 4; Furness, 8; and South African liners, 2.

These boats carried Canadian goods valued at \$8,324,569, and \$4,102,914 in foreign goods, making a total of \$12,427,483.

Last season seventy-four steamers took away \$10,272,494, being \$2,844,911 in excess of this season. While these figures show a falling off in trade so far as value is concerned, some of it can be accounted for by the price of wheat, which is from 10c to 15c lower than last season.

Arrivals this season to date were 82 steamships of 315,851 tons register, against 71 steamships of 236,937 tons last season. Shipments of live stock to date are 17,554 head of cattle, 1271 sheep and 44 horses.

Shipments of grain to-day are: Wheat, 1,504,585 bushels; barley, 55,414 bushels, and oats, 111,069 bushels.
