He was beling nursed at Anafe, near Punta Brava. The alcaide of Punta Brava received information from a spy as to Corbo's presence in the house. He sent out the Cano Guerillas and they surrounded the house. Corbo was taken out and tortured and finally killed. A negro laborer who happened to witness the affair was also killed. This was reported officially as a brilliant Spanish victory.

A detachment of Colonel Vincina's column recently killed a man 71 years old, named Jose Carrasco. The Spanish claimed he was a spy. The killing took place at Corral Falso.

On the Gaynor estate, also near Ccrral Falso, the Tarifa column came upon the owner of a farm who was killing an ox for consumption by his family. He was suspected of killing the beef for the insurgents and was shot without further investigation.

The volunteers of Corral Falso recently went to the ranch Marcos and killed a negro of 80 and a boy of 14. Continuing their march to the Ciego hamlet, they set fire to the huts and killed six occupants, under pretence that the place was a rebel camp They reported it as such.

While making a thorough examination of this ward, in which Burns was confined in the daytime, Governor Saeligrove discovered that by removing a piece of plank which formed the window sill of the water closet in the rear end of the ward, the prisoners had dug out a hole in the stone wall underneath the barred closet window large enough for a man to squeeze himself through into a small quadrangle in the fall yard outside, between the male and female yard.

A careful search of ward No. 2, occupied by Davis and Darrell revealed an exactly similar excavation under the closet window on that side of the building, showing that the prisoners were working in unison on the same plan of escape. They had replaced the board plank in the window sill so cleverly and refitted it in place so rightly that no one would be likely to suspect or detect it had been touched. The implements used in this work were an old rusty knife, which had been inlicked into a saw, and the piston rod of the force pump, which had been screwed off and employed as a crowbar.

Halifax, May 25.—There was an animated scene in the bay and off the harbor to-day. The ocean was fairly boiling with mackerel for miles around and a fleet of about 60 vessels floated in the midst of the teeming schools, some 40 of the craft being Gloucester fishermen. A swarm of seine boats followed the fish and two Dominion Government cruisers hovered in the vicinity to insure respect on the part of the Gloucester men of the three mile limit. Inside that limit the vessels taking fish were exceedingly fortunate, doing better perhaps than any outside. The mackerel followed the line on the shore very closely. Three schooners from the western shore came in this forenoon with an average of 200 barrels each. The mackerel are mostly No. 1 fish. There were hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth in the schools which were off the harbor to-

MILWAUKEE'S STRIKE SERIOUS.

Friends of Strikers Pelting the Street Cars With Bottles Containing Acids. Milwaukee, May 25.-The Milwaukee Street Railway Co. ran cars yesterday Street Railway Co. ran cars yesterday for the first time on Sunday since the strike began, but the inhabitants of this city shunned the cars as if they were pest-houses on wheels. Busses and express wagons, fitted up with seats, trucks with cotton awnings and all manner of conveyances were pressed into service. Last night several motormen and a policeman were struck with stones. A large mob of Poles attacked the cars and officers. Policeman Kruz was stabbed and seven arrests were made. Several cars were pelted with bottles containing blue vitrol and muriatic acid, and the clothing of what few passengers rode in them was rulned. There were many arrests throughout the city.


