Hon. Arthur S. Hardy Will Soon Fill the Old Man's Shoes.

The Ontario Cabinet was discussed at the Ontario Cabinet Meeting yesterday. The Premier's invitation to Mr. Laurier's visitation was warmly received.

Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. Messrs. Ross and Hardy were yesterday the recipients of many congratulatory messages from all parts of the country, and all three were naturally greatly jubilant over the success of their party had secured. They thought, however, that Ontario should have done better than that.

In the afternoon there was a meeting of the Cabinet, in which all the Ministers but Messrs. Ross and Hardy were present, when the re-formation of the Ontario Government, in view of Sir Oliver's prospective removal to Ottawa, was informally discussed.

Then Mr. Hardy will become Prime Minister and all other Ministers. Messrs. Ross, Hardy, Harcourt, Dryden and Gibson will retain their present positions, and Mr. Bronson will remain Minister of Lands Department, and the Vancouver Island, in this case of the Hon. Mr. Bronson, will be re-appointed.
