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

FIRST BLOOD FOR ANTI'S FEDERATION WAS BLOCKED

Trinity Corporation Met, But in View of Injunction, No Action Was Taken-

The injunction sought by the opponents of the scheme of federation proposed between the Universities of Trinity and Toronto was secured yesterday morning and the corporation of Trinity College was restrained from receiving, entertaining or sanctioning any agreement looking toward the amalgamation of the two universities. An ex parte application was made by Frank Arnoldi, K.C., before Mr. Justice Ferguson in his chambers, on Jehalf of Dr. William Nattress, a graduate of Trinity, Rev. Thomas W. Powel ate of Trinity, Rev. Thomas W. Powell of Eglinton, a graduate in divinity, who has not yet taken his degree in arts, and Rev. John Langtry, a member of convocation and of the corporation of Trinity College. The relators sue on behalf of themselves and all other graduates, undergraduates and members of the convocation. Affidavits were presented from Dr. Nattress and

were presented from Dr. Nattress and Dr. Langtry, in which were recited ine reasons against federation, which have been fully reported in the press. The defendants named in the writ are Rev. T. C. Street Macklem, provost of Trinity; J. A. Worrell, K.C., and Edward Martin, the committee which has had in charge the negotiations; the cor-poration of Trinity College and the six bishops of the Church of England in Ontario. The injunction restrains the committee from presenting their report, the corporation from accepting it and the lord bishops from giving it their sanction.

None of the defendants were represented at the beginning of the applica-

sented at the hearing of the applica-tion, but N. F. Davidson, K.C., a strong supporter of the federation movement, present to watch the proceedings.

was present to watch the proceedings. The order made was of the ordinary nature, being only temporary, and is returnable on Tuesday next, when further affidavits may be filed.

The papers in the case were served yesterday afternoon upon Crombie, Warrell and Gwynne, barristers, who accepted service for all of the defendants excepting the four bishops, who were too far from the city to be reached. This firm will represent the federationists' side of the case when it comes up for argument on Tuesday.

A meeting of the corporation of Trinity was held yesterday afternoon at the college, about thirty or forty members being present. On account of the legal action taken, there was no discussion of the terms of the agreement, but it was decided to employ counsel to defend the case and secure the dissolution of the restraining order, which, it was considered, would be a matter of no difficulty. The members of the corporation base their opinion on the terms of the act of parliament by which Trinity was instituted, in which, they state, the right of the college to enter into negotiations of the present nature was clearly expressed.
